

# Sydney Demands \$1,000 For Non-Appearance Of Islanders For Game

SYDNEY, Nov. 19 — (CP) — President Art Lipton of the Sydney Hockey Club said tonight Millionaires will demand forfeiture of \$1,000 and two points for Charlottetown Islanders' failure to turn up for a scheduled Maritime Major Hockey League encounter here.

Millionaires based their demands on the grounds that Islanders "had not kept faith in making a fair try" to reach Sydney for tonight's contest.

Sydney Vice-President Gene Connolly said the Charlottetown action was "unfair" to fans, many of whom had arrived at the Forum before it was announced the game would be called off.

Mr. Lipton was critical of actions of the Islanders in returning to Charlottetown after Tuesday night's game in Halifax, instead of remaining there overnight and travelling here today.

Announcement of the postponement was made tonight after a telephone conversation between Mr. Lipton and Charlottetown coach Murph Chamberlain in New Glasgow. Islanders had requested a postponement earlier in the day.

Mr. Lipton claimed the Charlottetown club had "lots of time" to reach here in time for the game.

## "Whitey" Ford Mustered Out of U. S. Army

FORT MONMOUTH, N. J., Nov. 19 — (AP) — Edward "Whitey" Ford, who as a rookie pitcher helped New York Yankees to their second straight world's baseball championship in 1950, was mustered out of the army today.

The southpaw star checked out of the Signal Corps centre here after a two-year hitch as a radar operator.

Ford, 24, said he weighs 185 pounds, only six over his normal pitching weight, and is in good shape.

He is expected to give manager Casey Stengel of Yankees another dependable starter to go along with Vic Raschi, Ed Lopat and Allie Reynolds in Bombers' quest for a fifth consecutive flag.

Ford said he plans to sell insurance in New York City between now and spring training. Ford amazed veteran baseball

men with his coolness and savvy under fire after he was called up to Yanks from Kansas City July 1, 1950, at the age of 21.

## The Bay Boys Out Of Playoffs But Have McCurdy Cup

TRURO, Nov. 19 — (CP) — The Maritime Rugby Union is wondering how it can clean up the season now that the McCurdy Cup, emblematic of Maritime supremacy, has been spirited off to the Bay.

Union secretary Dave Wilson said today he wired St. Francis Xavier University of Antigonish, present trophy holders, to send the cup here for the title match Saturday between Halifax Wanderers and St. Dunstan's University of Charlottetown.

But Glace Bay Caledonians, ruled out of the playoffs for failing to make a scheduled Armistice Day appearance against Wanderers, had taken the cup home in custody.

Mr. Wilson didn't know what the next step will be for the M. R. U.

In Glace Bay, Caledonia's playing manager Don MacInnis said anybody who wants the cup will have to come to the Bay to get it.

MacInnis has charged the union with "railroading" the Cape Breton team out of the playoffs. Caledonia still insists on the right to tackle the winners of the Wanderers-St. Dunstan's game for the trophy.

## Bruins Defeat Leafs 2-1; Red Wings And Rangers In 2-All Draw

TORONTO, Nov. 19 — (CP) — Boston Bruins scored two first-period goals and then laid down a terrific checking display to defeat Toronto Maple Leafs 2-1 tonight in a National Hockey League game.

A crowd of 12,544 saw Bruins score their fourth victory in five starts against the second-place Leafs.

The win left Boston in fifth position in the standing and postponed Leafs' attempt to take over the NHL lead from the idle Chicago Black Hawks.

Real Cheverellis, 20-year-old left winger, got both Boston tallies.

Tod Sloan, a 25-goal man last season but having rough luck around the nets this year, scored for Toronto, his first goal in 18 games.

Had weather conditions permitted the Islanders would have travelled to Sydney by plane yesterday. However all planes were grounded and the team left by car around 11 A.M.

They caught the one o'clock crossing at Borden and reached New Glasgow around six o'clock in the evening. Other than that officials here heard nothing from coach Chamberlain or anyone travelling with the team.

Efforts to locate Chamberlain late last night showed that the Islanders were not in New Glasgow, Truro or Amherst and it was believed that they were on the way back to the Island. There was a freight crossing from Cape Tormentine early this morning.

The Sydney case Sunday will likely revolve around the words "Fair try." The Millionaires charge that the Islanders could have made the trip to Halifax and Sydney by car and thus make sure of fulfilling their obligations. The Islanders, short-staffed and taking advantages of every opportunity to rest the players, decided to use planes for both games. They arrived back from Halifax by plane at two o'clock yesterday morning with the intention of taking off again for Sydney in the afternoon. When the bad weather rolled in and the flights were cancelled, it was impossible for the team to get away from here much before noon.

As it was they almost failed to catch the one o'clock crossing because of a difficulty to secure cars for the trip. They obtained their last car at 10:45 a.m.

Even if they had left here early in the day there is a question of whether or not they could make Sydney by game time. Country motorists reported heavy travelling in the eastern sections of the province yesterday afternoon and evening. This same storm hit Cape Breton in stronger force according to reports. Railway services in Cape Breton were disrupted yesterday and even last night in Sydney there were still power shortages.

The loss of the game is a tough blow to the Sydney Club. This same club is demanding two home games a week for the remainder of the schedule and claim they must have them in order to operate. The houses in Sydney average about the same number as those in Charlottetown. The loss of the game means that they will have at least \$1,000 to make up when it comes time to pass out the cheques at the end of the week.

Had the Islanders reached Cape Breton they might have managed to snare the McCurdy Cup from the Glace Bay Caledonians. It seems the Caledonians have obtained possession of the Cup although how it is not just clear. Last night the President of the Glace Bay Club stated that any team wanting the trophy would have to come to Cape Breton and play for it. Caledonia of course have a reason to be sore at the Maritime Rugby Union. They

were shunted out off the Senior playdowns through no fault of their own. However the chances of an outside team winning a football game in Glace Bay are slim as the Abbies can testify after their sudden-death abbreviated game of two years ago.

## Hamilton Tiger-Cats Tie Series With Toronto

TORONTO, Nov. 19 — (CP) — Hamilton Tiger-Cats defeated Toronto Argonauts 27-11 today to tie their home-and-home total-points series for the Big Four football championship 33-33.

The battling Bengals, Down 16 points after losing the opener of what was originally a total-points series, tied the round with a spectacular touchdown in the fourth quarter with time running out.

They struck with devastating force in the first half to score three converted touchdowns to take the lead on the round. But Argonauts came back with two touchdowns, one of them converted, to go ahead on the round again.

Argonauts were leading 33-27 on the round when Joe Shinn took a pass over the goal-line from quarter Bill MacKrides. The big crowd of 25,000 was tense as Tip Logan booted the convert which tied the round score.

A flip of the coin, which president Frank Blist of Tiger-Cats called wrong, decided the site of the third game for Varsity Stadium at 1 p. m. Saturday. The decision was made at a post-game meeting and it postponed the Eastern Canada final, scheduled to be played Saturday between the Big Four winner and Sarnia Imperials, Ontario rugby football champions. The eastern title game now will probably be played next Wednesday.
