HUGHES M. P. MAKES A MOTION

For the Enrolment of a Canadian Brigade

WITHDRAWS IT AT REQUEST OF MINISTER OF MILITIA.

After an Interesting Discussion on it and Other Matters.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, May 2.—After routine, Hughes moved that Great Britain should be given authority to enroll a brigade of Canadian officers and men for imperial service abroad.

An interesting discussion followed, after which Hughes at the request of the Minister of Militia withdrew his resolution.

Hughes then moved a resolution to the effect that the Government should grant transport and entrance fees to the Dominion Association matches, at least to those men who were not hitherto prize winners.

The purpose of the meeting is to bring up new shots and those who are not pot-hunting.

The Minister of Militia said he sympathized with all the schemes to bring up the average of shooting, and declared that such was the view of General Hutton.

Hughes then withdraws his motion the purpose of which was to give an opportunity for discussion.

THE RECOUNT IN BROCKVILLE

Partial Count of Ballots Gives White a Gain of 22.

BROCKVILLE, Ont., May 2.—The recount of the bye-election ballots was begun yesterday. At the hour of adjournment, the ballots cast in Brockville and the two divisions of Elizabethtown had been counted, with a net gain for White of 22.

OUR WINTER MAIL SERVICE

Explained in the House by Mr. Mulock

SENATOR FERGUSON UNABLE TO LEAVE OTTAWA:

Owing to the Serious Illness his Son.

OTTAWA, May 2.—Mr. Mulock informed Mr. Martin, P. E. Island that Mr. Dixon had a contract last winter to carry the mails from the Intercolonial to Cape Tormentine. There was no time to call for tenders. The price paid was six dollars per trip, the total sum being from January to April was \$786.

The mails were delivered 24 hours sooner than under the previous contract and the contractors only waited three tin es to make connections. The N. B., and P. E. I. Railway offered to run a special train for the mails at \$4000 for the season or for seventy dollars per day.

Sir Louis Davies said to Mr. Martin that William D. McMillan, formerly lighthouse keeper at Wood Islands, P. E. Island, was dismissed for offensive partisanship. Nothing else was reported against him.

Senator Ferguson is not able to leave the capital although the senate has adjourned for three weeks.

The Senator's son, who has just passed with high honors the examinations for the third year at the medical course at McGill, is ill in this city.

It will not be safe for the young man to travel for some days.

HONOR TO HIS MEMORY

Upon the death of Mr. E. P. Robins, the Graduate Students' Club of Cornell University special meeting, at which it decided to send the following message of sympathy to the family:

"The graduate students of Cornell University desire to make some expression of their sense of personal loss at the death of their fellow-member, Mr. E. P. Robins, and to extend to his family their deep sympathy in this bereavement."

"This loss will be most keenly felt among his most intimate friends, who learned to esteem him for his breadth and thoroughness, as a scholar, for his gentleness, sincerity, and worth as a man. Few, indeed, have been so esteemed as he or so worthy of esteem. The Canadian and Philosophical Clubs have lost in him their president and the Sage School of Philosophy a member whose ability it recognized in selecting him for the three successive years as scholar and fellow. His one contribution to his chosen subject was of such merit as to attract to him the attention of scholars the world over. Through his early death, therefore, philosophy itself has suffered a serious loss."

The Canadian Club of the University also met and passed resolutions concerning the death of Mr. E. P. Robins. These are in form of a letter to Mr. Robins' parents, and are as follows:

"The members of the Canadian Club of Cornell University sympathize with you and share your sorrow at the recent death of one who was so very near and dear to you. They esteemed Mr. Edwin Proctor Robins highly for his great talents and abilities, they respected him for his many manifold qualities, and they loved him for his cheerfulness, kindness and goodness.

Only a few months ago they elected him as their president, and his sudden removal just at the close of so honorable a career as a student has cast a gloom over all his fellow Canadians here."

Lord Bryon a Bankrupt.

LONDON, April 29.—The meeting of the creditors of Lord Byron (his cousin twice removed of the sixth Lord Byron, the illustrious poet, and ninth baron of the name) to take place to-day, and showed his liabilities to be £35,000, and his assets £50,000. A lawyer pleaded that his lordship should not be adjudicated a bankrupt, as this would disqualify him from sitting in the House of Lords. The matter was adjourned.

ISLAND AFFAIRS IN THE HOUSE

Mr. Martin, M. P., Moves for Information.

ON THE BRANCH RAILWAY IN P. E. ISLAND

And is Supported by Mr. A. C. Macdonald

OTTAWA, May 2.—Before the orders of the day were called, Premier Laurier gave his promised explanation of the Government programme for session.

He promised the budget speech for to-day. At the end of the budget debate the Drummond Railway Bill and the Pacific cable scheme would be taken up.

The Redistribution Bill would not be brought in before other business was completed.

The supplementary estimates and railway subsidies would exhaust the Government programme.

Mr. Alex Martin of P. E. I., in moving for the returns of Railway correspondence relating to the branch railway in his Province made an elaborate and careful argument to show that the Island Government had not got anything like fair consideration in railway construction and railway subsidies.

Mr. A. C. McDonald, P. E. I., supported Martin's contention. Sir Louis Davies, expressed the hope that the measures to be brought in later might give some relief.

The correspondence was ordered.

CECIL RHODES' PET SCHEME.

British Government Cannot Come to An Agreement.

LONDON, May 2.—In the House of Commons the Chancellor of the Exchequer announced that the Government had failed to come to an agreement with Cecil Rhodes respecting the proposed guarantee for the Cape to Cairo railway. The announcement was greeted with cheers by the Radical members of the House.

WILL HE SURRENDER?

Khalifa's Son Urging Him to Give Himself up.

CAIRO, April 29.—The Sheikh-el-Din, the Khalifa's son, is anxious to surrender himself to the British authorities, and also tried to persuade the Khalifa to surrender. His mother is at Omdurman. Sheikh-el-Din has the reputation of being humane, and prisoners say that he acted as a restraining influence on his father. The Khalifa is being constantly raided by the western tribes. He has no support in Kordofan and Darfur beyond his immediate following, and many sheikhs in those provinces have made their peace with the Government. Ahmed Fedil, after escaping from the fight at Rosaires, joined the Khalifa with a handful of followers.

Fighting in Samoa.

AUCKLAND, N. Z., April 28.—Advices just received here from Apia, Samoan islands, dated April 12, state that severe fighting has taken place between large bodies of friendly natives and the rebels. The casualties, it was thought, would not exceed twenty, and no Europeans were among the injured.

Portrait of the Queen.

LONDON, April 29.—M. Henri de Angli, the Austrian portrait painter, has been commissioned to paint a portrait of Queen Victoria. There is some feeling here that the commission should have been given to a Briton. M. de Angli has already painted the Queen twice.

Glorious War.

BERLIN, April 30.—Prof. Stengel, who recently issued a pamphlet defending war, has issued a second edition of the pamphlet, to which he has added an article specially dealing with the disarmament congress, to which he is a German delegate. The following is an extract:

"Instead of preaching everlasting peace, and raving about the Russian proposals, it would be better to teach the German nation that it must wear its warlike armament on sea and land in the interest of the national honor and welfare."
