BERN (Reuters)—The Swiss government announced today it asked a German scientist to leave the country because he carried out anti-aircraft 'death ray' tests financed by a foreign power.
A written reply to a parliamentary question said that the scientist, Hans Ehrhardt, had left Switzerland in February, 1961, under a false name.
He was later discovered that he had worked on rocket fuels in East Germany, the statement said.
Ehrhardt had legally obtained a permit to develop prototypes of death rays without cases, but never used it.
The statement said he carried out tests at his home near Sarnen in central Switzerland on a long...

CBC Revenues Continue Drop

OTTAWA (CP)—The CBC's commercial revenues continued to decline last year under the television advertising squeeze from the new private stations and their own television network. The loss in effect had to be covered by the federal treasury.
The CBC's annual report for the year ended last March 31, tabled in the Commons Friday, shows a total outlay of \$108,385,882 for all domestic TV operations. The CBC had planned to spend more but mid-year austerity cuts held the increase to \$54,728.
Normally the publicly-owned corporation, which won't accept sponsorship for many of its programs and won't advertise common products, gets roughly one-third of its revenue from advertising and Parliament votes the rest of its funds.

Backbench MPs Concerned Over Abridgement Of Rights

OTTAWA (CP)—Backbench MPs' concern over abridgement of their right to legal help in getting legislation before the Commons is mounting, says a spokesman, reliable sources said Friday.
A ripple on the otherwise calm surface of the Commons Friday.
Reynold Rapp (PC—Humboldt-Melfort—Tisdale) warned that if the problem is not solved, private members' bills eventually will disappear from the order paper which, in the opinion of many members, would be a tragedy, to say the least.
Mr. Rapp noted that the assistance MPs get 'from some officials of the (Commons) law office' in drafting these bills seems to be at variance with the opinion of other law officials who communicate with the (Speaker) on these matters.
Mr. Rapp was discreetly referring to what MPs have been complaining about privately for a period of weeks—their legal adviser, R. J. Batt, has had his activities on their behalf curtailed.
Outside the Commons, Mr. Batt said he would have to be done, those two in the Commons law branch, Mr. Batt and Commons law clerk Dr. P. M. Olivier, are at loggerheads.
Ruled Out of Order
He said many government bills as well as opposition backbenchers are disturbed, especially since a number of private members' bills have been ruled out of order on grounds they are unconstitutional.
Under the British North America Act, Canada's basic constitutional document, only the government may introduce legislation calling for the spending of public funds. There are provisions for amendments through which the government must bring such measures before the Commons.

Rackets Figure Surrenders In Mervin L. Gold Slaying
