A despatch has reached Ottawa stating that a force of mounted police were attacked by a band of Blackfoot Indians some distance from Medicine Hat, and that in the fight that ensued, the police were driven back and a number of them seriously injured. The police obtained reinforcements and succeeded in arresting forty of their assailants who are now imprisoned in Fort McLeod.

Bodies Recovered. SAN FRANCISCO, May 16. Advice by steamer from Honolulu and Sydney, which arrived here to-day, say that the bodies of 85 victims of the Bullie colliery disaster near Sydney, N. S. W., have been recovered.

Boycotting Again. LOUGHBRE, May 16. The boycotting of Mr. Tener, of the estates of Lord Clanciarie, in County Galway, has commenced. Several tradesmen have refused to supply him with food.

Opposed to Coercion. DENVER, Col., May 16. Over 3,000 citizens attended a public meeting at Music Hall last night to protest against the passage of the Coercion Bill now before the British Parliament.
