TO REPAIR. WHARF.—A large boom of logs came down the West River a few days ago, and is now at the marine wharf. These logs will be used in making repairs to this wharf.

PELT SALES.—The P. E. I. Fur Sales Board during the past few days sold by wire to New York dealers some twenty-five silver fox skins. The highest price paid was \$600 for a single skin. Prices ranged from \$225 to \$600.

THE BRANT.—The C. G. S. Brant is now in Pictou, engaged in placing the harbor buoys. From there she goes to Murray Harbor, Georgetown, and Annandale to place the buoys there. After placing these buoys the Brant will return to Charlottetown, and afterwards proceed west on buoy service.

CARRIERY OFF ROUTE JUNE 15.—It is expected that the Carriery will be taken off the Borden-Tormentine route about June 15th when she will be put on dry dock for necessary repairs and overhauling. While off the only connection will be by the Northumberland, and shippers and importers are advised that on and after June 1st an embargo will be placed on all bulk freight, until the Carriery returns, which may be several weeks, depending upon the amount of repairs necessary.

OF INTEREST TO FOX MEN.—Fox breeders in this Province will be interested to learn that Dr. Charles H. Higgins, consulting sanitarian, of Ottawa, late pathologist of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, hopes to be able this season to make a visit to Prince Edward Island. Dr. Higgins visited the Province several years ago; at which time he gave the breeders much valuable advice in regard to the diseases of foxes. His visit will be a great opportunity for the breeder to take up the question of the food most suited to bring about the best quality of fur.

PLANT POTATOES.—People in town who are attempting to do something in the gardening line this year should not forget to plant a few potatoes says the New Glasgow Chronicle and adds: The reports from the country districts, so far as we have been able to get them, show very clearly that farmers in general are not planning to plant as many potatoes this year as last, and the consequence will be that unless there is a larger yield from a smaller quantity, there will be a considerably smaller crop this season and prices will be much higher than they have been for the past few months. It is hardly necessary to tell the town consumer that a moderate price for potatoes has been one of the bright spots in connection with table expense this last year. There is no way of judging what prices will be like next winter for any eatable commodity, but this much is certain, that the householder who can raise a considerable proportion of the foods needed by his own family is on the safe side of the road. Other lines of vegetables may be prettier in the garden, than the spud, but very few will take his place on the table. For the reason that others are likely to give him more of the cold shoulder this year than last year we would strongly advise the town planter—don't forget a few spuds.

DEATH OF GUNNER CRASWELL.—A member of the P. E. Island Heavy Battery, on garrison duty in Halifax, send further particulars of the death of their comrade, Gunner Arthur Craswell, as follows:—The sad news reached the Battery on Saturday morning of the death of another of their popular and valuable members, Gr. Arthur Craswell, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. Craswell, Hunter River, P. E. I. His death was very sudden and unexpected and a severe shock to everyone. He was about to leave the hospital on Saturday morning for the fort, being discharged as recovered. As he was going to step into the motor car which was to take him to the boat, he took a weak turn and dropped dead along side the car. Gr. Craswell has been troubled with his heart for some time, complaining about it for a year or more. This young man has many friends who are shocked and grieved to hear of his sudden departure from this world. He was to return to the fort on Saturday morning and many of his comrades were waiting for him, but instead they received his sad news of his death. Many thanks are due Mrs. J. Kennedy, 16 Granville Street, Halifax, with whom Gr. Craswell boarded while on pass. She was very kind to him while he was in the hospital, bringing him fresh eggs, tobacco, fruit, etc., and offered to keep his remains in her house until ready for transportation to the Island. Mrs. Kennedy is a particularly good friend of the P. E. I. boys and they appreciate her kindness to their dear comrade. Capt. J. A. S. Bayer, Officers, N. C. O's and men desire to extend their heartfelt sympathy to his parents in the sad loss of their dear son while on active service.
