Granted Increase In Trucking Rates

On Saturday truckmen hauling gravel for the County Construction Company to the Georgetown road were granted a 12 1-2 per cent to 15 1-2 per cent raise in rates. This resulted in a one-cent raise across the board for yard-mileage hauls, and 25 cents per hour increase on clay-fill jobs.

Former rates were ten cents per yard per mile for the first five miles, eight cents per yard per mile for the next ten miles, and six cents per yard per mile for mileage above fifteen miles. A rate of \$2.50 was established for clay-fill jobs.

The truckmen had requested a two-cent increase in the rates, and \$3.00 for clay-fill jobs.

On Thursday of last week the truckmen's delegation met with Premier Jones, who promised an upward revision of the schedule. However, the truckmen claim that the increase was not sufficient to meet present expenses, because of increased costs of operation, and yesterday the trucks remained idle.

It was still undecided last evening whether another delegation would go to Charlottetown to negotiate for the remainder of the increase requested.

The death occurred at the King's County Hospital on June 4th, of Mrs. James MacFarlane, Lower Montague's oldest resident, in her 86th year.

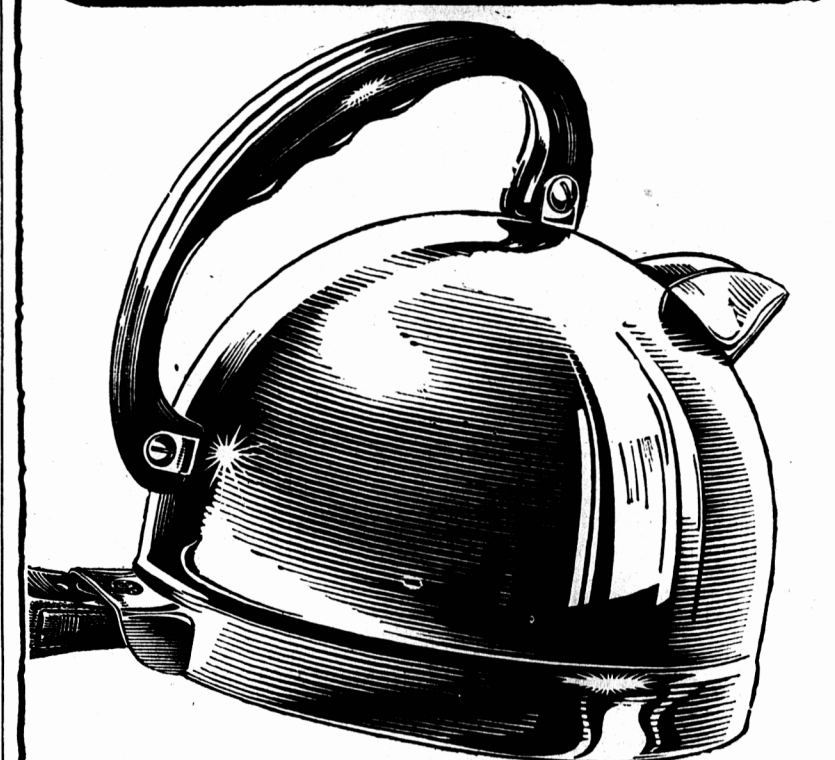
