**WAR NEWS.**

LONDON, Feb. 13.

The Porte refused to allow the British fleet to enter the Dardanelles, but as a compromise will allow two vessels of each Power to enter.

In consequence of the refusal the Channel fleet has been ordered to assemble at Gibraltar for orders.

The Admiralty have purchased two iron-clads in the London docks which were built for Turkey, but were not allowed to leave on account of the neutrality of England.

A dispatch from Rome says the Cardinals rejected the idea of reconciliation toward Italy.

Later dispatches say that the Russians are hourly expected to enter Constantinople, and if so the British fleet will force an entrance to the Dardanelles.

City Council.

THE CITY COUNCIL met last evening. Present—His Worship the Mayor, His Honor the Recorder *pro tem*, Councillors Peake, Harris, Crabbe, Davy, Hartz, Smith, Quirk and Morris.

A letter was read from Mr. Murdock, of Nova Scotia, with regard to the water supply. The letter was laid on the table.

The codified bye-law respecting market was read and, with a few small amendments, agreed to. It enacts that the limits of the market of this City shall include the whole of the limits of the City of Charlottetown, and that the "market place," when mentioned in the bye-law, shall be deemed that plot of ground at the west end of Queen Square. A discussion arose regarding the 2nd section, and Councillor Hartz was of opinion that the plot now known as the Market Square was given in two separate grants, i. e., the north and south side of the Square. He thought the matter should be properly considered, as the passage of that section might endanger a loss of a portion of the City property. The Recorder said he would look carefully into the matter, and the clause was then passed. The market place shall be open for the accommodation of the public on Tuesday and Friday, until such time as the Market Committee shall think proper to change the time. It shall not be lawful for any person—unless a lessee or licensed vendor—to expose for sale any produce, goods or chattels without first paying such toll for the same as prescribed in the list of tolls. Section 5th empowers the Market Committee of the City Council to regulate and superintend all business in connection with the Market. The Committee shall have power to alter, with the consent of the City Council, the Rules and Regulations, as well as the tolls. They may authorize the sale, by auction or tender, the tolls, rents of cellars, stalls, stands, etc. The amount to be paid for said tolls, rents, etc., shall be quarterly. They shall also appoint suitable places for the sale of hay, wood, etc. From section IX to XIV are special regulations for vendors of produce, goods or chattels, in the Market place. The Market Clerk may grant daily, weekly, monthly or quarterly licenses to sell anywhere within the Market limits, by special fees, rules and regulations, to be made by the Market Committee. No huckster shall occupy any place or stand in the Market place without being licensed so to do, and the fee for each license shall not exceed \$5.00. Any person guilty of an infraction of the bye-law shall, on conviction, be fined a sum not exceeding \$16. An amendment was made to reduce this amount to \$10, but it was lost on division.

A law for appointing the times for holding the quarterly meeting was read and agreed to. It enacts that the quarterly meeting of the Council "shall be held on the first Monday in the months of October, January, April and July."

A law respecting theatres and public shows was read and, with several amendments, agreed to. This law, as agreed to, enacts that no theatrical exhibition or show shall be allowed within the City without obtaining a license, for which they shall pay a sum not exceeding \$50. The license shall express the number of days the show is to remain, and they shall pay for each remaining day a sum not exceeding \$15, and if the exhibition is indecent or profane, the Mayor may order it to be at once closed.

COUNCILLOR CRABBE moved that the sum of \$100 be paid into the Merchants' Bank to the credit of the Fire Department, subject to the check of the Chief Engineer, in order that small sums due by the Fire Department may be paid. Carried.

COUNCILLOR HARRIS also moved that \$200 be placed in the Merchant's Bank, subject to check of the City Clerk, in order to defray small amounts,—the payments of these amounts to be afterwards confirmed by the Council. Carried.

THE MAYOR informed the Council that he had paid John Sinnott, wharf contractor, \$1000, being the second payment due him according to terms of contract. The Council confirmed the payment.

COUNCILLOR MORRIS made mention of a man

named James Keenan, paying a rental of less than \$21, who had been improperly taxed. Resolved that the tax collector be ordered to enquire into and report upon the matter.

The Mayor spoke of the case of a family named Dougherty who were in very indigent circumstances, and said that he had taken the responsibility of placing one of the children in the Convent where it would be cared for at the rate of \$1 per week, and paid for thirteen weeks in advance. The payment was confirmed by the Council.

COUNCILLOR CRABBE gave notice that at the next meeting he would move the resolution concerning the City Surveyor, of which he had given notice at a previous meeting. The Council then adjourned *sin die*.

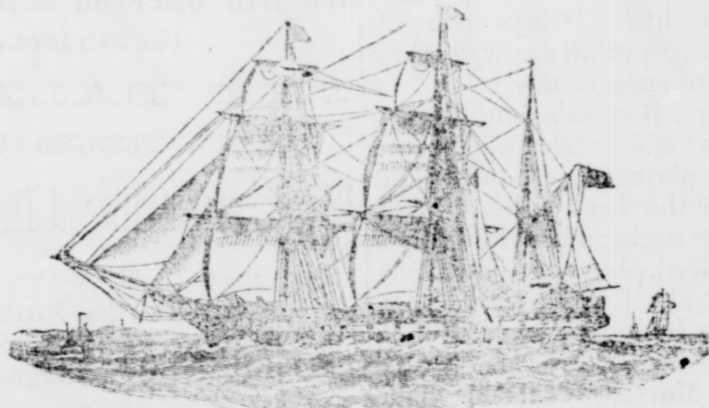

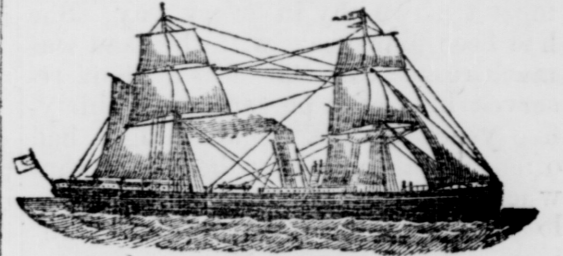
