FORGERY.—On the 22nd inst., a man named McIntyre, of St. Peter's, entered the store of Messrs. Poake Bros. & Co., and presented Mr. Handrahan with an order for four pounds of sugar and six pounds of tea. The order was signed by Mr. Kimble Coffin, of Mount Stewart, with whom the firm of Poake Bros. & Co. do a large business. It was accepted, and the groceries given to the bearer. After his departure the order was discovered to be a forgery. Mr. Handrahan had instructed the clerks to say nothing about it, but await McIntyre's return. To-day he entered the store with an order for two dollars worth of groceries. It was also signed Kimble Coffin and the same handwriting as the first. The clerks notified the members of the firm, the police were sent for, and various questions were put to McIntyre, all of which he answered evasively. Mr. Coffin, who was in the city, was sent for and pronounced the order a forgery. McIntyre was then handed over to the police. He will be examined to-morrow. The same individual entered the store of D. Farquharson, Esq., and asked him to do so; but McIntyre said he wanted some tea and sugar and leave the note in pawn. The groceries were given, but McIntyre has not yet returned to redeem his note. It is doubtless not worth the paper which entitled the sugar and tea.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.]

"Truth" on the Situation. LONDON, Sept. 24. Apropos of the popular agitation in favor of the Franchise Bill, Truth says:—The Cabinet are greatly impressed by the attitude of the country, and they have resolved to create fresh peers if a small majority of the House of Lords rejects the Franchise Bill a second time. If, however, the bill is rejected by a large majority, Parliament will be asked to express its views regarding the future constitutional position of the House of Lords, either by resolution or by an address to the House. If a dissolution of Parliament is brought about this autumn, the country will be consulted, not regarding the Commons but regarding the Lords. Truth believes this policy has been assented to by the Queen, and that the royal dukes will vote with the Liberals when the Franchise Bill is brought before the House of Lords again this autumn.

The Potato Crop. SPRINGFIELD, MASS., Sept. 24. The New England Harvester will this week publish an elaborate report on the potato crop from nearly 1,000 special correspondents. These reports show that throughout the Province, New England, and New York, the acreage and yield are considerably below last year. As a whole the acreage has decreased about five per cent., and the yield is about one-third less than in 1883. The rot is quite prevalent. The crop in the eastern provinces and Quebec is short. Rot is working badly in the great shipping sections of northern Maine, and many potatoes will have to be converted into starch.

The Horrors of War. PARIS, Sept. 24. Le Francois reports that as many as five hundred of the French troops in Tonquin are sick. It asserts also that Chinese troops have spread over the northern portion of the province of Quangyen, in North Eastern Tonquin, and are levying contributions upon the inhabitants.

A False Alarmist. NEW YORK, Sept. 24. A man named McCarron shouted fire during the performance at Mount Morris Theatre last night, and it was with difficulty that a panic was avoided. He was arrested and was to-day sentenced to six months imprisonment.

French Troops Sick. PARIS, Sept. 24. Le Francois reports that as many as 500 of the French troops in Tonquin are sick. It appears also that Chinese troops have spread over the northern portion of the province of Quangyen, in north-eastern Tonquin, and are levying contributions upon the inhabitants.

Disastrous Fire. LONDON, Sept. 24. A disastrous fire has occurred at Zortown in Syria. The Bazaar and forty houses were consumed. The fire has occasioned much suffering among the residents.

Sad Death of a Tourist. MCKINNEY, WYOMING, Sept. 24. The dead body of Gillie Leigh, member of the British Parliament, who strayed from a party of English tourists eight days since, has been found at the foot of a precipitous cliff in Big Horn Mountains.

The British Turf. LONDON, Sept. 24. At Newmarket to-day, the race for the Great Eastern Railway handicap, was won by Mr. Mantou's colt, "Energy." The Duke of Beaufort's filly, "L-hah," was second, and Gilbert's horse "Despair," was third.

Reinstalled. SHANGHAI, Sept. 24. Hi Hung Chang, the famous viceroy of China, and leader of the peace party, has been reinstated in all the offices he formerly held.

Safe. LONDON, Sept. 24. The surgeon and chief engineer of the gunboat Wasp are safe.
