Union Says Work Stoppage Is 'Completely Unacceptable'

Union men across Canada as well as Opposition Leader Diefenbaker Tuesday called on the federal government to scrap its bill to end the nationwide work stoppage by 118,000 railway employees.

Mr. Diefenbaker, in presenting a bill to amend the law, said the measure is inadequate but he added that if it were passed all parties should join in asking Canadians to "respect and follow the law."

Rank-and-file members interviewed by Montreal reporters echoed this sentiment, and expressed determination not to return to work on the basis of the government-sponsored legislation.
