The brig Verana arrived here this morning from Liverpool, N. S., in ballast. She will be loaded by Carvell Bros. with white oats for the West Indies. The sch. Lizzie C. sails this afternoon for Sydney and Gloucester Bay with a full cargo of oats shipped by Carvell Bros.

The Toronto Globe Favors the Sale.

TORONTO, Oct. 31. The Globe on Saturday in a double-leaded editorial advocates the sale of the Intercolonial Railway to the Canadian Pacific Railway and asks the Dominion Government for the safety of many vessels. Damage at Sea.

Results of the Hurricane

QUEENSTOWN, Oct. 31. Arriving vessels continue to report disasters resulting from the hurricane weather on the Atlantic, and fears are entertained for the safety of many vessels. The steamers Eruvia and City of Chester were unable to land here and proceeded to Liverpool.

BOSTON, Oct. 31. The British steamer Osanmore has arrived, bringing the captives and crew of eleven men and stewards of the shipwrecked barque Supreme. Capt. Irgesen, of the Supreme, states on Oct. 17th the barque was struck by a gale which increased to a hurricane, causing the vessel to ship great quantities of water and throwing her on her beam ends, where she remained several hours. The vessel sprang a leak, and the crew had to work incessantly at the pumps to keep her afloat. The following day the rudder was carried away, rendering her unmanageable. The gales blew incessantly for four days. The crew were completely exhausted when rescued.

Great Fire—Vessels Damaged.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 31. Point Breeze was visited by fire yesterday. The wharves and shipping were damaged to the extent of nearly \$200,000. The iron bark Felix was sunk, and the bark Elena and a lighter loaded with case oil were burned to the water's edge.

The Sophie Stewart, Captain Walsh, also had her cargo of potatoes completed. She has about 4,000 bushels on board with a quantity of turnips on deck.—Pioneer.
