Local and Other Items.

QUEBEC EXHIBITION—The date for the Quebec exhibition this year has been fixed for September 11 to September 16, inclusive.

REGULATING BICYCLISTS—A bye-law is about to be adopted in Quebec regulating the movements of bicyclists on the streets. Hitherto no such bye-law has existed in that city.

AT ROCKY POINT—The picnic of St. Dunstan's Sunday School will be held at Rocky Point, as advertised elsewhere. The managers are making preparations for a good time. Arrange to attend.

A WARNING TO OTHERS—Laura, the second daughter of the late John A. Purdy, school teacher of Springhill, N. S., who is staying at John W. Hunter's, at Leamington, is obliged to undergo the amputation of three toes, as the result of the application of carbolic acid for the removal of a corn.

WHERE VISITS COME HIGH—In the Supreme Court in Tompkins County, N. Y., Dr. E. L. Robinson, of McLean, has sued G. E. Chambers, of the same village, for \$10,000 for services. The physician made ten visits to the defendant's home during a recent illness of the latter, charging him \$1,000 per visit. The defendant has refused to pay, on the ground that the charges are exorbitant. The case is expected to be tried at the next term.

WANT WOMAN MAYOR—The little town of Lincoln, N. J., having taken breath after the first great effort which resulted in a board of women aldermen, is now thinking seriously of having a woman mayor. There is good reason for this. The 300 inhabitants of Lincoln have found their council of women great managers, who have made the town a thoroughly up-to-date place. In two years the women have secured all the modern improvements. The streets are paved and sewerage, electric lighting has been installed, and electric cars connect Lincoln with all the big cities of Jersey.

HAD A LIVELY TIME—The Fourth of July was celebrated in a lively fashion at Cripple Creek, Col. According to a correspondent the entertainment committee exploded 12,000 pounds of giant powder on the top of Blue mountain at ten o'clock at night. Holes were drilled and the explosion looked like a volcanic eruption. A 20-round prize fight was held in the main street, and also a cake walk for which \$250 in gold was offered. Then they built a bonfire on Mount Pisgah and burned 200 cords of wood. The town was not dry in the least, as 100 kegs of beer were sent for the thirsty. All over according to the Chicago Tribune, the following casualties have been reported for July 4th, 1899: Killed, 35; injured, 1,351; fire loss \$422,570. This year the fire losses were small. When Portland burned they mounted into the millions.
