THE HALIFAX TOURNAMENT.

Honors for the Islanders.

REGARDED WITH DISMAY.

Upholding the Island's Prestige.

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 12.

Yesterday was another glorious day for the Tournament, and fully seven thousand persons were present when the programme of sports commenced.

The Windsor, N. S., Hose Team carried off the \$300 prize and the Silver Trumpet in the half mile hose-reel race against all competitors in two minutes forty-three and a quarter seconds, which is the best time on record. The St. Stephen, N. B., Team came second, only half a second later. The other teams made the time in the following order, Yarmouth, N. S., Halifax, N. S., Charlottetown, P. E. I., Dartmouth, N. S., St. John, N. B., Portland, N. B., and Bangor, Me.

The Charlottetown team:—James King, captain and coupler; Jeremiah Meagher, coupler; Wm. Murray, pipeman; Frederick Bevan, John Whear, Frank Davidson, John McKenna, Thomas Wrystan, Jas. McQuillan, Hammond R. Large, Michael Connolly, and L. Coffin was the first team called out. The heat at the time was excessive. The boys did excellently but they were not accustomed to the ground and lost time in coupling the hose. Their official time is 2 minutes 53 seconds.

The Bangor team after all its brag and boasting and the betting in its favor, was disgracefully beaten. Halifax was also badly "left" as were also St. John and Portland.

The Charlottetown boys: Daniel J. McDonald, captain; Daniel Cameron, Edward Brecken, Charles Leigh, jr., John Allen, Joseph McNeill, Frank McDonald, John P. Murray, James McEachern, and Charles Kennedy, won the first prize of \$100 in the Salvage Corps race in one minute five and a quarter seconds, with the Halifax team a bad second.

New Glasgow won the Hook-and-Ladder race in the extraordinary time of 1 minute, 8 1/2 seconds; the Charlottetown team—Kenneth Finlayson, captain; Duncan MacRae, ladder-man; Patrick Burke, Charles Stewart, Jefferson Gardiner, Ronald McDonald, John Prond, Cephas Murley, Peter Doyle and A. Long came second, and Halifax third.

The representatives from the "bright little, tight little Island" have created the most favorable impression, and are regarded by their competitors with something like dismay.

Conspiracy to Defraud.

TORONTO, Aug. 12.

Yesterday afternoon Patrick Burns, coal dealer; Thomas C. Johnson, book-keeper, and Bernard McCarthy, collector, were arrested for conspiracy to defraud. Quarter-Master Sergeant Wanson, of the Infantry School, was also arrested later, and other arrests are to follow. Those arrested have given bail. The specific charge is for robbing the Government of Canada of \$10,000, being the amount out of which it is alleged the Customs have been defrauded by the importation of coal without the payment of duty.
