

Personal-Gossip.

The Hon. D. L. Macpherson has returned from England.

The Hon. A. P. Caron, Minister of Militia, has returned to Ottawa.

General Sir Garnet Wolseley will enter the Peerage of England as Baron Wolseley, and Admiral Beauchamp Seymour as Baron Alcester, of Alcester, in the County of Warwick.

Mr. Hiram Sibley, who is said to be the largest owner of cultivated land in America, and who was formerly president of the Western Union Telegraph Company, will erect in Chicago the largest seed warehouse in the world.

Herbert Spencer being a victim of insomnia, the Chatham Planet suggests that he be invited to Canada to listen to one of David Mills' four-hour sleeping potions. If that should fail to cure him, his case will be hopeless.

A queer operation at the Hotel Dieu, Montreal, by Dr. Hington, was the removal of an ovarian tumor from an infant two years old, the removal being quite as heavy as the child. The operation was a success. The case is regarded as among the most remarkable known to surgery.

Professor Tyndall, when unveiling the statue of Thomas Carlyle on the Thames Embankment at Chelsea, expressed a wish that a memorial should be raised on the same place to Ralph Waldo Emerson, the loftiest, the purest, most penetrating spirit that ever shone in American literature.

The London Echo, which has been a most active sympathizer with Arabi Pasha, suggests the following lines as applicable to him:—

Rebel or Patriot? Well, heads or tails! Define the terms, and this is how it reads: A Rebel is—a Patriot who fails; A Patriot is—a Rebel who succeeds.

Marshal Serrano's modification of the Spanish constitution of 1869 includes the recognition of King Alfonso and his dynasty as the legitimate rulers of the country, gives the King the power of dissolving the Cortes, providing a new Legislature be immediately summoned, limits the sittings of Congress to three months, and permits legislators to retain their rank in the new Legislature.

The Queen of Servia is perhaps the most beautiful of all the scions of the reigning families of Europe. She is above the middle height, with an elegantly moulded form, black eyes and hair, a brunette complexion, almost flawless features, and a manner that wins its way at once to the hearts of all whom Her Majesty endeavors to please. Dressed in a long trailing robe of black velvet, the Queen of Servia would grace the proudest court in Christendom.

It is stated in the London Standard that in conformity with the traditional custom of the hereditary Princes of Prussia, Prince William, the Emperor's eldest grandson, is about to enter the Civil Service, in order to obtain a practical knowledge of the working of the various branches of the Executive and Administrative organization of the country. For a hundred and fifty years past such has been the invariable practice of the heirs to the Prussian Crown. Frederick the Great, for instance, when heir-apparent, spent a considerable period in the Civil Service at Custrin. The present Emperor has been a member of the Council of State and been present at the discussions by the Ministers and Privy Councilors of all measures of importance which have passed into law since 1817.

The German Empress is in a critical condition of health that has been much aggravated by a succession of painful accidents to her person. While staying temporarily at the palace at Babelsburg she went to a door to call a servant. Supposing the door to be firmly closed, she leaned heavily against it in attempting to open it, but it happened not to be caught in the lock, and yielding to her pressure, the Empress fell headlong to the floor. Her age and feeble condition made the fall a severe shock to her, and, although with a great exertion of will power, she at once arose and walked about for ten minutes as a precaution against stiffening of the joints, she did not get over the effects of the accident. Two days later, while walking through the salon, her feet became entangled in the train of her dress, and she fell again at full length upon the floor, seriously injuring one foot. She is now under the constant care of a physician.

A popular young printer in Augusta, Me., who, until recently, resided beneath his father's roof-tree, married a few weeks since and leased apartments in another part of the city. The other evening, after completing his day's work, he left the office, went up street and purchased his Boston paper, and then climbed the hill to his father's house. Entering his familiar precincts he marched to the wash-room, made his toilet, and then presented himself at the table. The family, who had been watching his operations, eyed him with amazement, and at last his mother softly inquired, "My son, have you procured a divorce thus early in your wedded career?" A pale crimson flush suffused the young man's face, which rapidly deepened into cardinal. Then he gasped, "I forgot all about being married." Leaving the table amid a roar of laughter the young man hurried out and walked hastily home, where his young wife was impatiently awaiting his coming.

Mr. Fawcett is perhaps the most Radical and he is certainly the most outspoken, member of Mr. Gladstone's Government. In a recent speech the Postmaster-General set forth the Liberal programme. Should the rules of Procedure, after the pattern submitted by the Premier, be accepted, the Government will set about a more than herculean task. First the land tenure of England and Scotland will be dealt with. Mr. Fawcett candidly admits that they will so far carry out their avowed programme as to enfranchise the rural householders and secure "a juster distribution of seats" as the earliest possible opportunity. He was good enough to add that, whatever may be the changes in parliamentary representation, the minority would be entitled to be heard "in proportion to their numbers." No one can say that the Government have not a healthy appetite for work. Besides reckoning with Ireland, with municipal reform, with bankruptcy, with licensing, and at least a dozen other remedial measures more or less ripe for legislative treatment.
