

### Montague Cancer Society Is Organized, Officers Named

A group of enthusiastic citizens of Montague met in the Bison Rainbow Room, Montague, on Monday evening, and united to form a Division Unit of the Canadian Cancer Society, the third such Division Unit to be set up in Prince Edward Island this year.

Beaton, president of the Prince Edward Island Division of the Cancer Society. ### CCF Angry, Trans-Mountain Co. Stock Split Is Approved

OTTAWA (CP) — Two CCF members stalked out in protest, and some Progressive Conservative members voiced misgivings, but a Commons committee nonetheless approved Tuesday a projected five-for-one stock split that Trans Mountain Oil Pipe Line Company has had in and out of its mind for more than a year.

When the Commons met later, the committee's report approving the measure was challenged by Erhart Regier (CCF — Burnaby-Coquitlam) and Speaker Roland Michener decided to make a ruling later on Mr. Regier's claim the bill actually was killed in committee.

Heated argument developed over whether the bill had in fact been killed in committee. Proceedings July 29, Chairman Gordon K. Fraser said, a vote taken then had been to have further discussion on the bill.

With CCF member Frank Howard, member for Skeena, saying he would appeal the procedure on the floor of the Commons. But Mr. Fraser said precedent demanded that the matter be settled within the committee.

### Reveal Tentative Plans For Queen's Visit To Canada

By BILL BOSS Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA (CP) — Tentative plans for the Queen's visit to Canada next year with Prince Philip call for the royal couple to travel by Canada's inland waterways to the head of the Great Lakes and also to Chicago, reliable sources said Tuesday.

Emphasizing that the planning is still in the project stage, with details still to be worked out by a government hospitality committee, the sources said the royal couple will probably be in Canada about six weeks.

There is a continuing exchange between the prime minister's office and Buckingham Palace, but they are still on the level of "cavassing of ideas." The royal children, the Prince of Wales and Princess Anne, in all likelihood will not be along.

Arrangements needed to ensure the Britannia's passage up the seaway and the Great Lakes route, which would entail security as well as navigation and supply, already are under study by various government departments.

(Continued from Page 3) dition of the queen. But when it is realized that honey production will probably be decreased by at least 50 per cent if it occurs, preventive measures should certainly be taken.

It is extremely important to avoid congestion in the colony. Examine hives in the evening when all bees are in for numbers present. There is no serious disadvantage in piling on two or three empty supers a week or two before the honey flow really starts.

Perhaps the only sure method of preventing swarming is to go through the brood chamber not less than every ten days to remove all queen cells. In order that no cells are missed it may be necessary to shake the bees off by giving the frame a sharp shake in front of the hive. Removed queen and bees will crawl back into the hive themselves.

Swarming can be delayed by clipping the wings of the queen. Then she can't leave, as she sometimes does, 4-5 days before the new queen emerges. It gives the beekeeper extra time to go through his colony.

There is no set time when the beekeeper can stop looking for queen cells. When no queen cells are being built it's a fair indication that swarming fever has subsided.

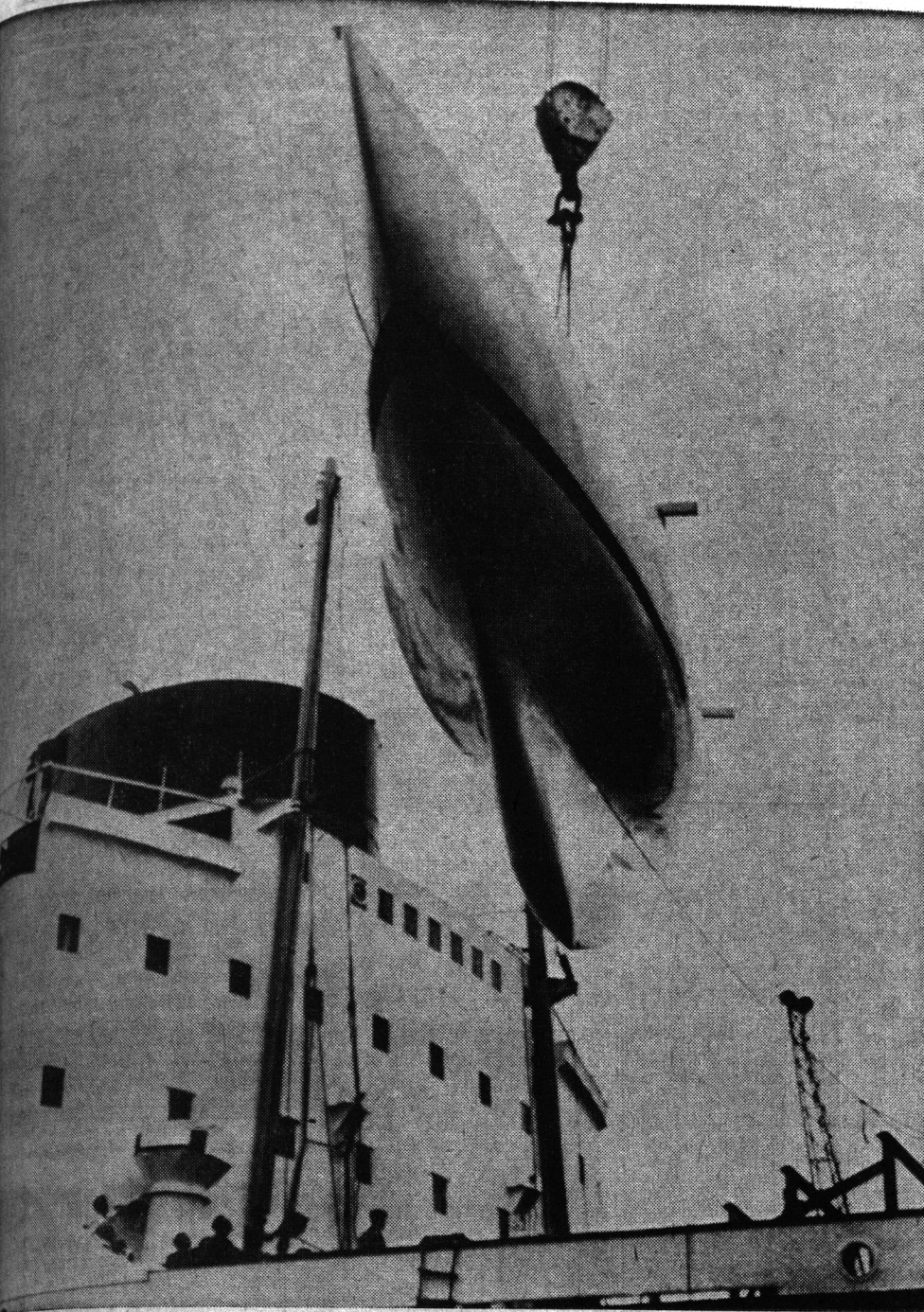
