N. Y. Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)— A record high was set last week by the stock market. That completes the recovery from the major March break.

The market has racked up eight straight advances, an unusually long string, with the last four establishing highs.

Last March 4 the market reached a high with the Associated Press average of 60 stocks at \$162.60. Then it tumbled for six days in a major reaction. It took nearly five weeks of steady recovery to overcome the effects of that deep drop. But this week the AP average stood at \$164.80, a record.

The five most active issues last week on the New York exchange were Avco Mo. up 3/4 at 7 1/2, Chrysler up 6/8 at 80, Baldwin-Lima-Hamilton off 3/4 at 19 1/2, Anaconda Copper up 2 at 63 1/2, and Merck off 3/4 at 27.

The five most active on the American exchange were Wilrich Petroleum up 3-16 at 13-16; C and C Super up 3/4 at 2 1/2; Sapphire Petroleum up 1-16 at 4 1/4; Anaconda Copper up 2 at 63 1/2, and Standard Industries up 3/4 at 5 1/2.

WOOL MARKETING

Wool will be received at the E. D. Reid Warehouse, Lower Prince Street, Charlottetown, from May 9th to July 15th. A trucking allowance of 3/4 of a cent per lb. will be paid on all wool delivered to our warehouse in Charlottetown. Wool may also be left at the following warehouses, from where it will be delivered to our warehouse in Charlottetown at least once a week:

Tignish Co-op; Callaghan's Store, St. Louis; J. W. D. Campbell's, Alberton; O'Leary Co-op; Wellington Co-op; Tracadie Co-op; Morell Co-op; St. Peter's Co-op; Souris Co-op; Roland MacPherson, Murray Harbour; (wool may either be left at his warehouse, or arrangements made with him.)

Other points of collection will be announced later.

Large sacks may be secured from the P. E. I. Sheep Breeders' Association in Charlottetown, and The Department of Agriculture office in Summerside. Twine and tags for tying wool may be secured at either of the above points. EACH SACK SHOULD BE TAGGED WITH THE NAME AND ADDRESS OF THE OWNER WRITTEN IN CLEAR LETTERING WITH INK, ONE TAG TO BE SECURELY ATTACHED TO THE OUTSIDE OF THE SACK AND ANOTHER PLACED INSIDE.

THE ADVANCE ON WOOL will be almost doubled from the 20c per pound which it has been the past few years. The exact advance will be announced by press and radio in approximately a week.

It is in your interest to see that wool is properly prepared for market. Growers should:

(1) Remove all tags and dung locks before tying each fleece.

(2) Any burry, chaffy or strawy portions of wool should be removed and packed separately.

(3) Sheep should be shorn when dry, and wool should be stored in a place free from dampness.

(4) If there are any black fleeces, mark it on shipping tags.

There will be a rebate paid on wool shipped in 1953 and 1954 if these growers ship again in 1955.

We ask for your co-operation in shipping wool to us this year.

U.S. Steel

CLEVELAND (AP)— Steel production is scaring with only 10 per cent of the industry's U. S. output going for defence purposes.

That was reported today by Steel, a metalworking weekly, which listed ingot output at 95.5 per cent of rated capacity for the

week ended April 17.

That week manufacturers produced 2,304,880 net tons of steel—highest weekly amount since the record 2,324,000 tons set March 29, 1953, during the Korean war.

Steel commented: "Gain in civilian business... is the cause for the high steel production. Among reasons for it are:

"Expanding population, high output of automobiles, high rate of construction, need to increase steel inventories into line with higher consumption rates and some stock piling in anticipation of a steel price rise."

The magazine reported its price composite on finished steel steady at \$118.45 a net ton, and on steelmaking scrap, \$37.41 a gross ton.

Howe Comments On Dairy Products Market Problem

AUCKLAND, N. Z. (CP) Canada's Trade Minister Howe, on a goodwill visit to Australia and New Zealand, said today during a brief stop here that there is little possibility of Canada importing either butter or cheese from New Zealand.

Howe, accompanied by W. F. Bull, deputy trade minister, left immediately for Australia. They will return to New Zealand April 26.

Howe said butter and cheese are two of Canada's most "sensitive" products.

"The difficulty is that our dairy products are about the highest

priced in the world. That's the penalty we have to pay for trying to farm in a cold climate.

"We can't sell our cheese and butter overseas so we're compelled to use it at home.

"We have faced this problem for many years and frankly I can't see any way out of it."

Thus there was little hope of Canada taking dairy products from New Zealand, although he realized that were the main items New Zealand wanted to sell to Canada.

SEEKS OTHER PRODUCTS
Howe said one of the main objects of his mission is to find what other products New Zealand and Australia have to offer. He agreed that were the main items New Zealand wanted to sell to Canada, he would take account of the big quantities of New Zealand wool Canada bought through Britain.

With this included, the balance was just about even.

The New Zealand Herald suggests the possibility of extending meat exports to Canada. In an editorial the Auckland paper says the average Canadian eats only a few pounds of lamb and mutton yearly, and if New Zealand farmers were encouraged to export from Ottawa they should be capable of stimulating demand.

Trade might be confined to two or three months during the Canadian winter with the emphasis on specialty lines, but even this would be well worth while, The Herald says.

Suggest Snow Helped In Man's Development

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—Some experiments with chimpanzees have convinced a Virginia medical scientist that snow played a part in the development of man from his ape-like ancestors.

The experiments involve a loosely-constructed theory that snow and cold made man's ancestors uncomfortable, caused them to stand upright to escape the chilling wetness; that the upright position made their adrenal glands work harder because of the unnatural stress involved, and that the erect posture resulted in an increased demand by the brain for blood.
