

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN. OTTAWA, Nov. 1. The Local Legislature of Quebec will be dissolved on the 9th inst.; nominations on the 30th inst., and voting on the 3rd December. It is stated that J. X. Perrault will contest Montreal East at the coming Provincial election.

UNITED STATES. NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 1. It is roughly estimated that the suspended Mechanics' National Bank's assets will pay depositors 50 to 60 per cent. The amount of the defalcation is stated to be \$2,000,000.

NEW YORK, Oct. 31. A Newark despatch says at a meeting of the directors of the Mechanics' National Bank, held yesterday afternoon, cashier O. L. Baldwin stated to them that the bank was not in a condition to pay, and that the liabilities were so great that further attempts to carry on business would be useless.

NEWARK, Oct. 30. Cashier Baldwin of the Mechanics' Bank was waited upon this afternoon at his house by the United States District Attorney and Commissioner Keasby, and was admitted to bail in \$25,000 to appear at court November 7th.

NEWARK, Oct. 30. Baldwin said voluntarily that about the year 1873 he began to make loans to C. Nugent & Co., without security and without the sanction of the Directors.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND. LONDON, Nov. 1. All the collieries in Southwest Lancashire have stopped till Thursday.

Heavy snow storms and gales are reported throughout England. The "Standard" denies that Gladstone has resigned the Chancellorship of the Exchequer, as reported.

The Boston ship "Jamestown," from St. John to Liverpool, long since abandoned, has been discovered ashore near Reijavik, the capital of Iceland, with grass growing on her decks.

Municipal elections throughout England and Wales show Conservative gains in a great many places. Parnell, who has been unanimously elected Chairman of the Cork Chamber of Commerce, was seized with violent spasms on Sunday, suffering several hours.
