THE Hon. Mr. Wightman will, we are glad to learn, be able to take his seat in the Legislature on Wednesday.

ELIAS LAYCOCK recently won two races in Australia, one of which was for the championship of Queensland.

WE are glad to learn that the Locomotive drivers on the P. E. Island Railway, have received an increase of wages, for the first time since the opening of the Railway.

THE Charlottetown Engineer Corps will meet to-morrow (Tuesday) the 7th instant, at 7.30 p. m., at the Drill Shed, for drill and to receive their clothing. A full attendance is necessary.

LONDON Vanity Fair says the present gambling mania in private life is carried to such lengths as to become a serious social scandal. Large sums, it is said, are lost and won, and some well-known ladies are pointed at as regular players.

A. LORD, Esq., Agent for the Marine and Fisheries Department, received a despatch from Georgetown to-day, stating that the "Northern Light" was this morning reported off Cape Sharp, working into Georgetown harbor.

"How is it the Chairman of the Street Committee is not giving us any benefits?" asks a taxpayer of the West End. Our sidewalks and streets are dangerous for horse and foot. Would it not be well for the energetic Chairman to call upon the people of the West.

In the case of Mme. Stephen, who obtained a divorce from her husband, James Fisk, a merchant resident in Montreal, Judge Torrance, of Montreal, has decided that there was no question of the facts. The chief question was one of law, as to whether the Supreme Court of New York had power to grant a divorce under the circumstances. He held that it had this power, and that its judgment was valid. Defendant was ordered to re-appear to plant an account of the manner in which he had managed her property, and to pay her \$225,000 with interest and costs. The judgment has taken both lawyers and public in Montreal by surprise, as divorces granted in the United States have not been held as valid in the Dominion before.

THE rain and snow of Saturday, followed by frost, has seriously disarranged the running of trains on the Railway. Saturday's train from Tignish was snowed up at North Wiltshire, and notwithstanding the most persistent efforts, did not get clear until early this (Monday) morning. The train which left here Saturday morning for Tignish, was caught and stuck all night in a drift about two miles from destination, arriving there about ten yesterday morning. All other trains arrived at terminal stations Saturday evening. The track yesterday morning was in many places covered with water and slush, from three to fifteen inches deep, and in order to prevent this from freezing and effectually blocking the road, plows and flangers were run over the line, east of Charlottetown yesterday, and, in consequence, that portion of the line is open and trains on time to-day. To the westward, in consequence of the train being mentioned, having been snowed up, it was impossible to send plows and flangers in that direction, and, therefore, the frost last night has so completely iced the road up that no passenger trains are running to-day. In consequence of the ice on rails, one snow plow was off track seven times in eleven miles this morning, while, at the time of going to press, we understand the engine and plow which left Tignish this morning is off track about ten miles from that point. The train men are deserving of great praise for the determined manner in which they face these storms. Conductor Kelly and his men arrived this morning about six o'clock, having been on duty continuously for forty-eight hours. The entire line will be open for traffic again to-morrow, if all goes well.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

LONDON, March 5.

Special prayers and thanksgiving services were held in nearly all the churches and chapels of England to-day, with reference to the Queen's escape from the attempt upon her life. Mr. Gladstone and Earl Granville were present at the Chapel Royal, St. James' Palace, the preacher being the Bishop of St. David's. The most noteworthy services were those held by Dean Bradley at Westminster Abbey, Canon Brothers at Chapel Royal, Savoy, the Bishop of Rochester at St. Paul's, Mr. Spurgeon at the Tabernacle, and Dr. Parker at the City Temple. The Press Association understands that the Queen was in no way so much affected by any message as by that from President Arthur. The radical journals on the Continent generally deplore the attempt on the Queen's life.

LONDON, March 6.

The Daily News, of this morning, says: "Earl Granville, in the House of Lords, and Mr. Gladstone, in the House of Commons, to-night or to-morrow, will move an address, congratulating the Queen on her escape from assassination."

NEW YORK, March 5.

A special cable from Limerick, speaking of Mr. Forster's recent visit there, says, on good authority, that the introduction of martial law and a mild form of the Curfew Law was recommended for County Clare, by the City Council. The whole of East Clare is in a terrible state of lawlessness, notwithstanding a large force of soldiers and constabulary. The recent daring exploits of moonlighters have caused the greatest alarm and uneasiness.

LONDON, March 4.

The Observer says it is authorized to state that should Bradlaugh not present himself to take the oath on Monday, Sir Stafford Northcote will call for a writ and move the House to reaffirm its resolution of the 7th of February, that Bradlaugh be not permitted to go through the form of repeating the words of the oath. It is not expected that Bradlaugh will present himself before Tuesday.

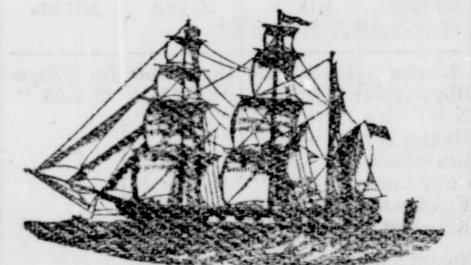

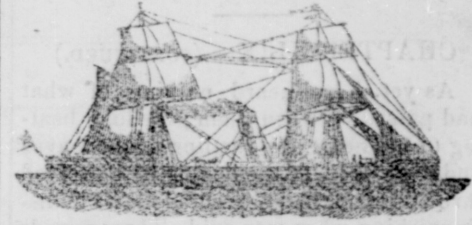
