

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

OUR MARKET.—Today's market was fairly well attended, and the supply good. Butter sold at from 19 to 22c; eggs from 6 to 8c; hay from 60 to 70c; oats at 40c; mackerel, 6 to 10c each; lobsters from 2 to 2s, and fresh codfish from 10 to 50c each. Potatoes have advanced from 40 to 45c per bushel.

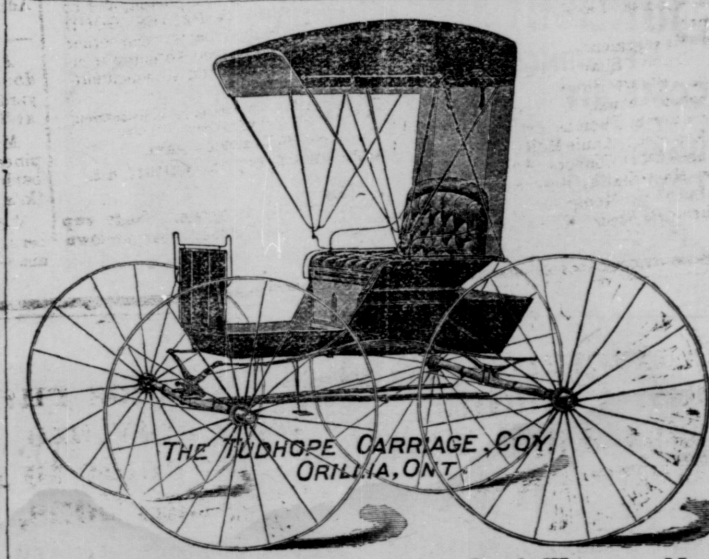
