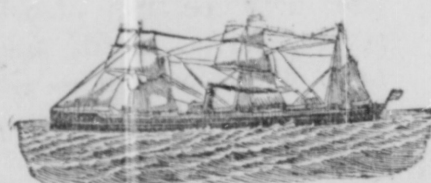

OCTOBER MAGAZINES

THE CANADIAN.

Rather lighter than usual is the verdict which a reader is likely to give after cutting the leaves of the October "Canadian Magazine." The lightness is due to short stories and photographs in abundance. "Cyrus Pincher's Three-hing Bee" is a humorous tale which will appeal to all observers of country life. Charles Lewis Shaw tells a good hunting story under the title "Dodging a Moose," while another writer details his experience in a sailing skill with a whiskey smuggler on the Lake of the Woods at the time of the building of the C. P. R. Among the heavier articles is one by Principal Grant, on "Newfoundland and Canada," in which he advocates the confederation of Newfoundland and the extension to her of more liberal terms on the part of Canada. S. T. Wood of the Toronto Globe writes on "Social Amelioration," or the differences between doing good and doing right. R. W. Shannon has a short article on "Misquotation;" J. Macdonald Oxley reviews Mr. Lighthall's new novel; and John A. Ewan summarizes in his brilliant style the foreign events of the month. Among the illustrated articles is one on "Rowing in Canada," which will please all lovers of sport, another on "Recent Premiers of Newfoundland," and the last of Sir John Bourne's articles on the "Makers of Canada." The latter contains three splendid illustrations of the monuments at Ottawa to Sir John A. Macdonald and Sir George Cartier, and the one at Toronto to the Hon. George Brown. Among the other portraits in the issue are pictures of Gaudaur and Johnson, who rowed at Vancouver in August; some amateur photographs showing scenes on the outskirts of Toronto; and photographs of all the provincial legislative buildings.

THE NEW BRUNSWICK

The New Brunswick Magazine for October continues the account of the First Families of the Acadians by Mr. James Hannay, and the story of the Early Settlement of St. John, by Rev. W. O. Raymond. The latter paper is illustrated by a fine portrait of James Simonds. Some account of the ravages of ship fever among the immigrants at St. John, in 1871 is given by Mr. W. K. Reynolds, and this is accompanied by a page portrait of Dr. James P. Collins, who died in the discharge of his duty. The first printed narrative of the remarkable Babcock Tragedy, at Shediac, in 1805 is contributed by "Roslynade." A new feature of the Magazine is a chronological table of events of provincial interest, arranged for each day of the current month, with a marriage and a death anniversary for each day of the month, given in the words of the original newspaper notices of various years of the past. The magazine is edited and published by W. K. Reynolds, St. John, at \$1.50 a year; single copies 15 cents each.

SCRIBNER'S.

The article in the October Scribner's on the "Battle of San Juan," by Richard Harding Davis, is not only a vivid description of that famous victory but a complete and careful analysis of the conduct of the whole Santiago campaign. He points out with perfect clearness the problems involved, shows the lack of adequate preparation, and says that the final success obtained was due solely to the splendid and persistent valor of the troops who fought under the most trying and discouraging conditions, combined with the destruction of Cervera's fleet by the navy. Mr. Davis places the blame where he believes it is due, and at the same time gives all credit to the men who did the real work. It is a deliberate and conscientious history of the campaign, and worthy of permanent record. The illustrations are from photographs and drawings of actual scenes. Captain Arthur H. Lee, of the Royal Artillery, the British Military Attache who accompanied the troops to Cuba, writes of "The Regulars at El Caney." This article, coming from the representative of a friendly nation and having the authority of a trained soldier will have a special interest and value for American readers. It contains a careful account of the management of the battle, the disposition of troops, etc, and at the same time is full of color and moving descriptions of scenes and incidents observed by the author, who was constantly at the front in exposed positions. He pays ample tribute to the fighting qualities of American soldiers. One of the few correspondents present on "The Day of the Surrender" at Santiago was J. F. J. Archibald, and his account of the scenes in the trenches when the truce was announced and the memorable and dramatic raising of the Stars and Stripes over the palace gives a realizing impression of both the glory and pathos of war. Few readers of magazines or newspapers have other than a vague idea of the difficulties and hardships endured by the men who write the accounts of the doings of the army and navy. Mr. John R. Spears, author of "A History of the Navy," and a famous newspaper correspondent, gives some of his own and others' experiences in "Albat for News in War Times."

HARPERS.

The October number of Harper's Magazine opens with an interesting article by Dr. Sven Hedin on his recent explorations in Asia, entitled "On the Roof of the World." Next to Nansen's expedition to the Pole, Dr. Hedin's journey is the most remarkable feat of exploration of recent times. In the present article he describes mountaineering adventures on Muz-Tagh-Ata, "the father of ice-mountains," and the perishing of an expedition in the desert of Takla-Makan. His perils and adventures proved no less remarkable than the scientific value of his discoveries. The article is illustrated from the author's photographs, and from drawings after the author's sketches.
