For her wedding the bride chose a tailored blue all-wool English gabardine suit with white accessories. Her corsage was of pink roses.

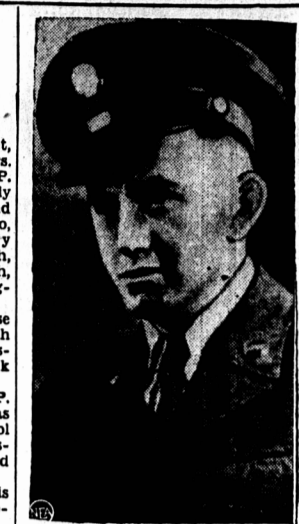

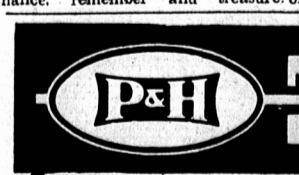

W.C.T.U. NOTES

SOBRIETY KNOWS NO COMPETITOR

When all the emotionalism has been expended, and when all the statistics have been quoted, one fact stands out crystal clear: sobriety knows no competitor. The person with alcohol in his bloodstream is always at a disadvantage.

The sermons of Isaiah, the Hebrew prophet of the eighth century before Christ, which have been preserved for us in the Old Testament, make it perfectly plain that all the problems with which we have to deal in connection with alcohol were pressing problems in that day, with the possible exception of those that result from the economic organization of the liquor traffic.

It should be remembered however, that the drunkenness to which reference is made in the Old Testament, was always that which resulted from the use of fermented wines. The process of distillation by which alcoholic beverages containing more than about 14 per cent of alcohol are obtained, was not developed until relatively recent times.

The Witness for the Prosecution

Anyone interested in attending the trial of John Barleycorn cannot fail to be impressed by the character of the witness summoned by the prosecution. The social worker testifies that alcohol is found in connection with a large percentage of the cases she is called upon to solve. Medical testimony indicates that the use of alcohol is contributory to a long list of disturbances. The psychologist says that even a small amount of alcohol in the bloodstream has an effect upon the nervous system which makes it impossible for the drinker to accurately evaluate or judge his own actions. The psychiatrist says that alcohol becomes a crutch for the individual who is seeking escape from reality. The insurance men say they could ensure motorists for a fraction of the cost involved in insuring drinkers. The ambulance corps say that alcohol is present when a large percentage of the accidents occur, and the highway commission reports that John Barleycorn is a major offender on the roads of the nation.

One Way Street

In all the testimony relative to alcohol, even including that offered by the witnesses for the defence, it is evident that the consumer of alcohol is travelling a one-way street. Whatever difference alcohol makes in the behaviour of the individual is a loss.

The drinker loses accuracy when he drinks while tending a machine, his reactions are slowed up if he drinks and then sits behind the steering wheel of an automobile, his capacity for self-criticism is decreased the moment that alcohol enters his bloodstream, and finds its way to his very centre. The athlete falls short of his best performance when under the influence of alcohol, even in small doses, and because of the effect upon his perceptive powers is unable to recognize the fact that he has lost his usual skills and championship abilities.

The sober nation need never fear the competition of a drinking people. This was the truth which Isaiah undertook to impress on the Hebrews of the eighth century. The drunkenness which he saw on every hand he recognized as the symptom of disaster which was just around the corner for the nation.

Change may be sudden, radical and far-reaching, with reactions on all the desires, aspirations, emotions and accomplishments of a vivid career. So much is dramatic, adding verve and charm to the joy of living.

But a modicum of discretion and practical evaluation is enjoined, even under the romantic stimuli of the Pilsener moon. A child born on this day should be richly gifted with the skills, versatility, stamina and keen adaptability of the ever-flowing tides of a romantic life.
