Meeting Of Milo United Credit Union

United Credit Union, Milo, held its annual meeting in Milo Hall on Monday evening, October 22nd. The president, Mr. James Buote, conducted the meeting and reported the activities of the board for the year just ended. The financial report was read by the treasurer, Mr. Elmer Boulter. It showed considerable withdrawal from share capital during the year with not sufficient new capital coming in to show advancement in savings. It was pointed out that shares withdrawn were all too often never replaced. On the other hand, if a loan is taken out instead of a withdrawal of share capital, greater effort will be made on the part of the borrower to repay this than would be made by him to replace share capital. In this way his savings are not disturbed, his security is kept good, and his protection through share and loan insurance is increased greatly. New appointments to the board of directors are: Lowell Clements, Tom Silliker, Willard Betts, John MacKinnon, replacing Leslie Gorell, Emmet Greenan, Oliver Gorell, Foster Hetherly, Leslie MacKinnon, replacing the retiring credit committee man, John MacKinnon, and John Buote filled the vacancy on the supervisory committee created by the retiring member, Leo Doyle. Dividends at the rate of 2 1/2% were declared on share capital for the past year. The guest speaker was Mr. Melvin Bridges, director of St. Anthony's Credit Union, Bloomfield and also a director of the P. E. I. Credit Union League. Mr. Bridges, with his usual dry humour and compelling seriousness, cited particularly the need for a strong credit union and an active and alert membership. He also explained the new self-endorsement plan proposed by the League, and further paved the way for a lively discussion among the members prior to the closing of the meeting.
