THE LOUD SPEAKER

Has Sea Lives About Used Up

NEW WESTMINSTER, B.C. (CP)—The wife of marine engineer Kaarlo Eriksson thinks her husband has just about "used up

most of his nine lives at sea by now."

That was Mrs. Eriksson's reaction when told her 46-year-old husband was safely taken off the freighter African Queen which broke up off the Maryland Coast Tuesday. Eriksson was the ship's chief engineer.

Mrs. Eriksson said her husband has experienced three other close calls. Twice she was with him aboard the Swedish freighter Christen Falen when it split apart outside Yokohama in a typhoon.

In 1946, Mrs. Eriksson was with her husband aboard the Swedish freighter Goonawarra in mid-Pacific when an engine blew up, killing the chief and second engineers.

In 1941 Eriksson was fighting for Finland in the war with Russia. He and 16 other Finns took a submarine and escaped to the U.S. where they went ashore as political refugees.

When they returned to the sub to get their gear, it blew up. "I think he's used up most of his nine sea lives by now," Mrs. Eriksson said.

DAIRYING

The total manufacture of butter in Canada from January to the end of November, 1958, amounted to 321,986,000 pounds compared with 288,729,000 pounds for the same period in 1957, which is an increase of 33,257,000 pounds or approximately 12 per cent.

In Prince Edward Island, the total manufacture of butter from January to the end of November in 1958 amounted to 5,744,000 pounds, compared with 5,391,000 pounds during the same period in 1957. An increase of 353,000 pounds or approximately 7 per cent.

The total manufacture of cheese in Canada from January to the end of November in 1958 amounted to 84,170,000 pounds compared with 92,379,000 pounds during the same period in 1957. A decrease of 8,209,000 pounds or approximately 9 per cent.

The total manufacture of cheese in Prince Edward Island from January to the end of November 1958 amounted to 752,000 pounds compared with 842,000 during the same period in 1957. A decrease of 90,000 pounds or approximately 11 per cent.

EXPERIMENTAL FARM HEADQUARTERS ENTERING 50TH. YEAR

Experimental Farm At Charlottetown In Review

R.C. PARENT Superintendent. The past year has been a good one for crop production on Prince Edward Island, particularly for clovers, hay and pastures. This has been favourably reflected in the production of meats and products.

The year has been a busy one at the Experimental Farm. New research projects have been initiated and a considerable amount of construction has been undertaken, and the Farm has been visited by many individual farmers, farm groups and others.

Preparations are well underway to make 1959 a particularly interesting year. Celebration marking the 50th Anniversary of the Farm will be held. The principal

regrettable since last year's show was one of the coldest on record for Prince Edward Island.

The most interesting report was given by M.S. Horsburgh as representative to the Annual Meeting of the Canadian Beekeepers Council held in Vancouver. His report dealt with a wide range of subjects affecting Canadian beekeeping. It made special mention of the contributions made by the various provincial apiculturists to the work of the Council. In the past they have attended these meetings as visitors with their own official meetings being held immediately before the Council meetings. In the future they will be asked to attend Council meetings as consultants, thus receiving more recognition for the service they render. Mr. Horsburgh regretted that no Maritime provincial apiculturists attended the meeting this year.

The report also stressed the importance of the work of the American Honey Institute. This organization, which receives financial support from the Council, carries on extensive honey publicity work in Canada and the U.S.A.

Following the reports the three provincial apiculturist led off in a discussion of various topics of interest. This feature drew wide participation from those present and was finally terminated because time was running out.
