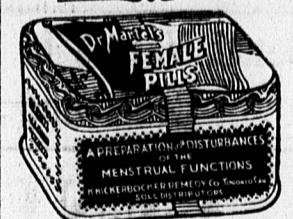
150TH ANNIVERSARY LAND-

Dr. P. F. Duffy Passes Away After Lingering Illness

Prominent Physician and Citizen
of Chatham—Was 46
years of Age

Dr. Patrick F. Duffy, one of the
best known members of the medi-
cal profession on the North Shore
and one of Chatham's foremost
citizens passed away this morning
at 8.30 o'clock, after an illness
of several weeks duration. He was
only 46 years of age and deep sym-
ptoms will be extended to his re-
vered wife and family, and his
parents who survive him.

Dr. Duffy was born in Char-
lottetown, P. E. I., in 1876, son
of Mr and Mrs James J. Duffy.
He received his schooling in that
city and at St. Dunstan's College
going to McGill for his medical
course where in 1900, he graduated
with the M. D. C. M., of that Uni-
versity. The doctor always took
a deep interest in athletics and
while at McGill was a member of
the Medical Football team, the
winners of the Game Cup for four
years from 1896 to 1900. This in-
terest in sports was carried to his
adopted town of Chatham, and Dr.
Duffy was always foremost in
promoting clean, healthful sport
in this community. His work in
connection with hockey, baseball
and other sports is still fresh in
the minds of citizens as he only
retired from the presidency of the
Chatham Athletic Association
within the past year. A genial,
witty physician, his presence in
sick room or pleasure ground was
always an inspiration and his loss
is a severe one to the town and
citizens in general.

Shortly after locating in the
Miramichi, Dr. Duffy married Miss
Anna Hennessy, daughter of Mr.
Patrick Hennessy, of Newcastle.
His wife, six children, Frank, Pat,
Rick, Catherine, Jack Joe and
Charlie; also his parents, Mr. and
Mrs. James J. Duffy, Lake Verdes,
P. E. I.; seven brothers and five sis-
ters, viz: John F., employed by
the Lieut. Governor; Joseph, Mrs.
Michael Connolly, Charlottetown;
Susan, Mrs. John Callaghan, Mrs.
Nicholson, Jim, Peter, Michael,
Philip, Boston; Fred and Sons at
home. He was a member of
Miramichi Council, 1291, K. of C.
and of the Hotel Dieu Medical
staff, in the development of which
institution he always took a deep
interest.

The funeral was held on Friday
morning from his late residence
at 8.45 o'clock to the cathedral.

The funeral of the late Dr. P. F.
Duffy was held Friday morning,
May 5th, at 8.45 o'clock from his
residence, Water Street, and the
large number of citizens who paid
their last tribute of respect by
gathering for the funeral obsequies
showed how great a hold this pop-
ular physician had obtained upon
the affections of a large part of
the community.

Lloyd George May Return Immediately

LONDON, May 8.—It is general-
ly believed, says a Reuter despatch
from Geneva, timed midnight, that
M. Jaspard, the Belgian foreign
minister, will not maintain his op-
position to the memorandum pre-
sented to Russia, while it is ex-
pected France and Belgium will
accept as now framed.
If the memorandum is not accept-
ed, Premier Lloyd George probably
will return to London immediately.

MONTREAL PORT STRIKE OVER

MONTREAL, May 8.—Differen-
ces between the shipping federation
and the syndicated longshoremen
will be ended by the signing of an
agreement under which the union
accepts the reduced scale of wages
offered by the companies while the
latter agree that their dock labor
shall be supplied by the union.

The settlement brings to an end
a situation which had existed since
April 16 and which on April 25 and
May 2 resulted in lawless outbreaks
involving the shooting of two con-
stable while repelling rioters.

The men go back on a wage re-
duction of ten cents an hour as
compared with last year's rates.
They will receive fifty cents an
hour with extra pay for overtime
and night work.

SUPER-CROOK IS CAUGHT

PARIS, May 8.—The sportsman-
ship of Gillet Armand, "the man
with a hundred names," which
made him one of the most success-
ful crooks operating in France in
recent years, did not desert him
when he was arrested in Nancy
today. Instead of giving the police
trouble when he saw himself cor-
nered, he congratulated them on
being more clever than himself.

Armand has been sought by the
police in every big city in France,
in all of which in the past two
years he has skillfully robbed jew-
ellers to the extent of 2,000,000. He
capitalized his fine appearance and
personality, knowledge of gems and
courage. Entering a city, he regis-
tered at the best hotel and made
a large deposit in a reputable bank.
Then, dressing himself in his best
style, he started in to make an im-
pression by spending money. After
a day or two he would call on the
best jeweller, admire some ring and
finally buy articles valued at be-
tween 10,000 and 30,000 francs. For
these he would give a check on the
local bank. He would then change
his clothes and repeat the opera-
tion at a different store. When
his morning's operations were fin-
ished he would draw his money
from the bank and make a quick
exit from the town.

It was his habit of changing cos-
tumes which was his undoing. His
appearing in the streets of Nancy
one morning in three different suits
of clothes caused the police to fol-
low and apprehend him.
