Assault Case Heads Docket; 4 Speeders Are Also Fined

Pleading guilty to a charge of common assault, Phillip MacLeod, Cambridge, Mass., was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days in jail by Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Queens County magistrate's court yesterday afternoon.

Due to the deputy attorney-general being at a conference in Halifax, N.S., Amos Ronald MacIntyre, Bedford, and Harold Joseph MacKinnon, Goose River, are both remanded until July 8.

Counselled by John P. Nicholson, MacIntyre is charged with driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol, and MacKinnon with driving while intoxicated.

Pleading guilty to having possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than his residence, another accused was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days in jail. Nearly all cases dealt with in the traffic section of the court were for charges of speeding.

Pleading guilty for this offence were: John Alan MacDougall, Nine Mile Creek, fined \$15 and costs or five days for travelling 51 m.p.h. in a 40 m.p.h. zone; Donald Currie, Bonshaw, \$10 and costs or five days for travelling 51 m.p.h. in a 40 m.p.h. zone; Walter John Riehl, Summerside, \$15 and costs or five days for travelling 54 m.p.h. in a 40 m.p.h. zone; and Everett James MacDougall, Vernon, \$15 and costs or five days for travelling 69 m.p.h. in a 55 m.p.h. zone.

Mr. MacDougall also pleaded guilty to passing another vehicle on a solid white line and was fined \$10 without costs or five days.

Water Pollution Danger Warned As Checks Stop

Testing and sampling of the pollution in the waters used as Charlottetown swimming areas, which has been done in the past five years, is not being continued this year, it became known yesterday.

"For over five years we tried to tell people of the situation," it was explained by Dr. Burton Howatt, deputy health minister. "But apparently little interest was taken in our findings so we are no longer continuing the testing."

Other sources said that public apathy could result in a serious contamination problem and a dangerous threat to health.

The previous efforts of public health authorities in the provincial department had the purpose of alerting the public to those in official places to the dangers which could arise from the dumping of raw sewage in harbor waters.

Their findings have been reported, over previous years.

DAILY TESTS MADE

Through that period the department conducted almost daily tests of nearby waters especially in areas where children swim, or which were known to be subject to contamination from the outpourings of sewers.

Conditions were shown to be at dangerous levels in several places.

Tests last year revealed the Charlottetown waterfront and the beach around Riverside Hospital to be the worst sections so far as water contamination was concerned.

In the technical process of testing, a count of the bacteria in a 100 c.c. using a specified amount of water and a report is made based on the "most probable number" of bacteria found.

Any such count which reveals a number higher than 300 is considered undesirable at least. Last year's testing at Riverside Beach showed an almost constant count of bacteria between 1,000 and 1,500.

The situation at York Point Wharf was generally good during the month of July but worsened rapidly in August and the bacterial count rose quickly and remained around the 1,300 level.

Lewis Point was generally good with the count only occasionally passing the 300 mark.

However, at Brighton Light House it was very bad practically all of the time with consistent counts of 10 to 1000. Brighton shore ranged from good to bad with the same condition existing at the section near the canteen at York Point.

The count varied according to whether the wind was blowing onshore or offshore.

"DISGUSTING SIGHT"
It was definitely serious at all times around the Naval Barracks and this year floating sewage creates what one man termed a "disgusting sight" with small boats anchored nearby actually being discolored as a result.

There are some relatively good areas, but not on this side of the Hillsborough River.

At Humbery Surgery things are generally good and only sometimes had with the same applying to Southport Wharf, in the cottage area of Rosebank conditions are bad only when a strong onshore wind drives sewage across the harbor, otherwise the area is comparatively safe.

Keppoch Beach and Rocky Point both rate as the best of the areas near the city with the low count under practically all conditions.

REMEDY EXPENSIVE
How to remedy the situation

is something which is solely a civic problem but sewage treatment is the recommended method.

This can be done satisfactorily through the "primary treatment" method which would involve the outlay of a relatively large sum of money for a plant to handle the job. No official estimate of the cost is available, but it is believed it would be in the vicinity of a quarter million dollars.

The method provides for a "settling out" of all solids in the sewage and clarifying the effluent before the remaining liquid is emptied into the harbor.

Asked about this Dr. Howatt said it was generally satisfactory as it killed the bacteria but medical authorities still had some reservations as to effectiveness regarding viruses.

As any proposal for a remedy for the situation the reports indicate it would be useless for Charlottetown to proceed alone. As unless both Paradise and Riverside Hospital were included of the danger would continue from sewage coming down river from the other side of Hillsborough Bridge.
