

Canadian Golfer Winner Of \$15,000 Sanford Open

SANFORD, Fla. (AP)—Canadian PGA champion Al Balding of Toronto fired a two-under-par 68 despite a bogey on the final hole and won the \$15,000 Sanford Open golf tournament Sunday. His 280 total was 11 under par for the 72 holes.

Ill., shot a 69 for a 270 total and a second-place tie with Mike Souchak of Grossinger's, N. Y. Oliver started the round tied with Balding for the lead. Two par three holes brought the genial Porky's downfall.

FIRST TRIUMPH
The victory, worth \$2,400 to the tall, slender 32-year-old Toronto professional, was Balding's first triumph in the United States.

"I think it's the first American victory by any Canadian," he added. "I don't know of anyone who ever won a PGA tournament in the United States."

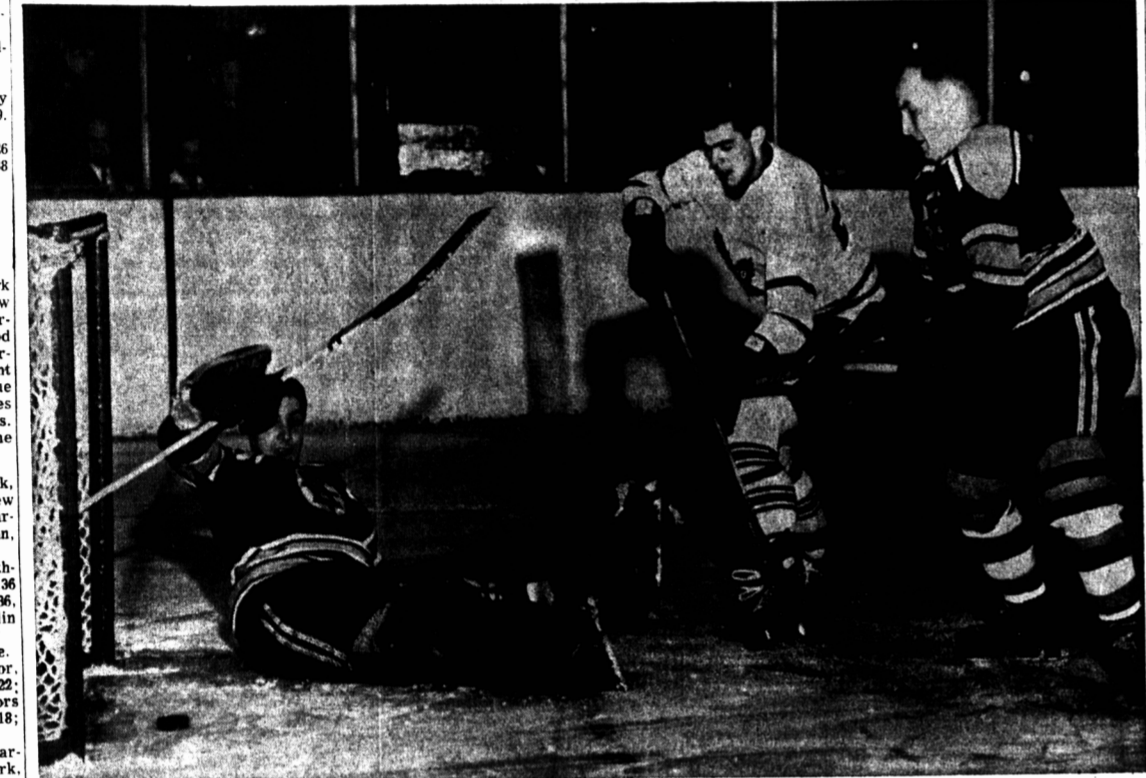
