NEWS NOTES

President Kruger has presented a rare specimen of native gold to the Royal Geological Museum at Berlin. The gift is said to be worth about £300.

Chief of police Harrison of Westmount, a suburb of Montreal, has fallen a victim to smallpox. The other patients in the smallpox hospital are doing well.

The French newspapers are complaining because the word "friendship" is the keynote of all the official utterances at Constant and St. Petersburg instead of the word "alliance."

The Ministers of Great Britain, France, and Russia at Athens have notified their Governments that it is impossible for Greece to pay an indemnity exceeding two million pounds Turkish.

The London Echo states that the Duke and Duchess of York have accepted the invitation of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Premier of Canada, to visit the Dominion during the spring of 1897, while on their way to Australia.

Count Matsui, ex-Minister of Foreign Affairs, and one of the most distinguished men in the history of the new Japanese movement, and who, with the Marquis Ito, moulded the policy of the modern Empire, is dead from lung trouble.

Prince Charles Theodore of Bavaria, the royal oculist, has been staying at Merano, in the Tyrol, and during his sojourn there has received a large number of patients of all classes. On the 12th ultimo the Prince gave his one thousandth consultation.

Lord Salisbury's proposal that Greece should be asked to state precisely what she possesses for paying the indemnity, and insisting upon the signing of the peace preliminaries as already framed, is supported by Russia and France, but opposed by the other powers.

The eminent Swiss specialist, Dr. Yersin, a pupil of Pasteur, declares his conviction that the plague which has prevailed in Southern China since 1894, and in British India since 1896, is the genuine black death of the middle ages, and that it will in all probability reach Europe in a year or two.

The success of the visit of the Duke and Duchess of York to Ireland is likely to convince the Imperial authorities that annual Royal visits and the establishment of a Royal residence there would do more to tranquillize the Irish party than years of parliamentary debate and legislation.

The Canadian Government will make a test this fall of an overland route to the Klondyke, via, Edmonton and the Peace river. The party to be chosen will be five in number, and will form a portion of the force who are to remain in the Yukon district.

The council of the Barristers' society of Nova Scotia have issued a circular to all members of the profession throughout the Dominion calling attention to the meeting of the Canadian Bar association taking place in this city on Tuesday next, 31st inst. All lawyers, whether members of the association or not, are invited to attend.

The salmon run on the Fraser river this season is reported to be the greatest on record, and the canners' harvest will be a good one. The method of taking salmon in the Pacific coast rivers is a wasteful one, and it has been continued for many years now. The royal fish would appear to be one of the very few that can hold its own against the slaughter of the fishermen.

The full name of the King of Siam, who is now visiting England, is said to be Somdech Phra Paraminda Maha, Chulalongkorn, Patinder, Maha, Mongkut, Purusirarat, Raja Ra, Wongse, Warut, Mabongse, Parabut, Warakhattiana, Ra Ja Nikaro Tama Chaturanta, Prama, Maha, Chak Rubar, Tira, Gasaanka, Parundharm, Maha Rajad Hiraja Para Manareth Pabita Phra Chula Chumkian Chat Yu Hua. As there is a possibility of his visiting this country next year it is well to remember it.

Owing to the fact that there have been two cases recently of persons having their sight destroyed by the enormous hats that are now worn by women, the London newspapers have started a crusade against the fashion. A man who was riding in an omnibus had one of his eyes pierced with a pin in the hat of a woman sitting next to him, her head being thrown against his face by a sudden jolt in the vehicle. In the other case a girl was blinded by a pin in the hat of a companion with whom she was playing.

United States Minister Woodford does not appear to be meeting with much to assure him in his sounding of European opinion as to the United States' intervention in Cuba. The rulers of Europe do not as a general thing sympathize with republics, and are less likely than usual to do so when a republic is set against one of themselves. Outside of the United States President McKinley is likely to be advised on the Cuban question to mind his own business.

WATERWORKS SURVEY.—The Summer-side correspondent of the Guardian writes: Mr. Hunt, chairman of the town council, has completed arrangements with Prof. Lea for the survey in connection with the proposed waterworks and sewerage system. The survey will be commenced on Monday. In addition to his previous proposal Prof. Lea is to make duplicate plans and exhibit them in Montreal to parties who wish to tender for the work, write the specifications for tender and furnish an estimate of revenue and cost of maintenance. The whole will cost the town about \$300. Test wells will be sunk at the different probable sources of supply to ascertain the quantity of water available.

It is announced that the preferential clause of the tariff has been made applicable to goods from another batch of countries having "most favored nation" provisions in their trade treaties with Great Britain. The Gazette says it was plain from the first, as was pointed out by the Conservative leaders in Parliament, that this course would have to be taken, and things would have been simplified if it had been taken at first. The Laurier Government, however, thought it best to come down to its position by degrees. First Belgium and Germany were recognized as entitled to the same tariff treatment as Great Britain. Then, by another circular, like privileges were extended to the products of France. Now, some score of nations are added to the list; and about all the countries not included are our good customers, Newfoundland, the West Indies and the United States. The cabinet of lawyers has shown itself strong neither in law nor business.

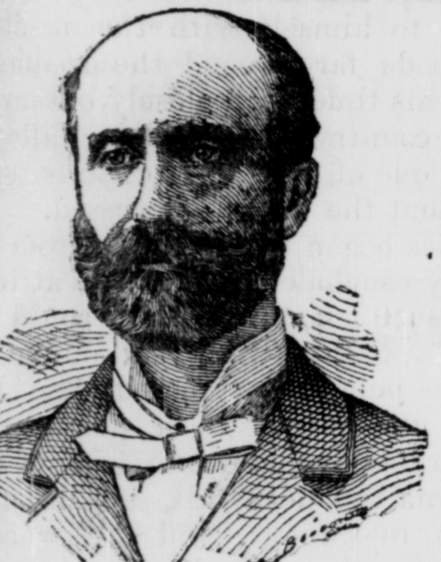
