## Kensington Lions Plan Exchange Of Students

KENSINGTON — Eric Jessome has announced that plans for the exchange of a grade 10 or 11 student of Kensington High School with a student of Kensington, Maryland, U.S.A., have been finalized. After receiving a letter from Robert Moxley of Kensington, Maryland, Mr. Jessome stated that the boy or girl from the Kensington Regional High School who wins the prize "will really be busy".

The itinerary calls for the student to visit 15 places of interest in Washington, including the White House, the Capitol, and the Smithsonian Institute. While there, he or she will live in the homes of three Lions Club members. The student will leave by air on July 9 for Kensington, Maryland.

Christopher Selby, a grade 10 student from Kensington, Maryland, will be visiting with the Kensington Lions in their homes and although all plans are not yet final, it is hoped to have him spend a day with the department of fisheries, the RCAF, and the RCMP, to visit the experimental farms at Summerside and Charlottetown, visit Canada Packers' plant in Charlottetown, Seaman Bros. plant in New Annan, make a tour of the western end of the island with stops at Summerside, the biological station at Ellerslie, the wooden mills in Bloomfield, village of O'Leary, Leavitts Ltd. and the shipyards in Alberton.

A tour of the Eastern end of the island is also planned, including stops at Moore's wildlife sanctuary, the museum at Montague, Eastern Packing plant at Souris, and the Morrell Creamery.

A tour of the City of Charlottetown is planned with a meeting with the mayor, the premier and the Lieutenant-Governor. Also included in the plans for the entertainment of the Maryland student is a tour of the Main-gash salt mines in Pugwash, N.S., and a day as the guest of the Moncton Lions Club.

This exchange is being supported by the Kensington Lions Club, and is open to all students of grades 10 and 11 of Kensington Regional High School.

## Special Speakers Are Heard At O'Leary UC Anniversary

O'LEARY — O'Leary United Church congregation celebrated its 75th anniversary with three special services on Sunday. Morning worship was conducted by the minister, Rev. David Hamilton, assisted by Rev. A.F. Baker of Truro, a former minister of the charge, who led in prayer.

"On being a non-conformist" was the theme chosen by guest preacher, Rev. Robert S. Lashmer of Trinity Church, Charlottetown. He based his thoughts on the words of Jesus, "the sabbath was made for men, and not men for sabbath" and the words of St. Paul, "be not conforming to this world."

He spoke of the ease of conforming, but reminded his hearers that Jesus was probably the top ranking non-conformist of all time. "We have received from our Lord, from our church and from our forefathers a heritage of non-conformity," he said.

The great moments of history have been when some man stood out alone in the world for his convictions, he said.

Special music was a trio, "What have we done for the Saviour today?" by Mr. and Mrs. Ralph McLellan and Edward McDougall. The anthem, "Now thank we all our God" was sung by the choir. The organ was Mrs. Lewis Bernard.

At the close of the service two new elders, Harold McNeill and Heath Woodside, were admitted as members of the church session.

The afternoon service was attended by members of Corinthian Lodge No. 19 AF and AM.

Rev. C.R. Webber of Trinity Church, Summerside, chairman of Prince Edward Island presbytery and grand chaplain of the Masonic Order in Prince Edward Island, was guest preacher.

On this special Sunday in the life of the congregation Mr. Webber noted that an anniversary is a time of remembrance "when we look back and see how God leads and directs his people. It is a time of thanksgiving, also for visions given to men and for the strength and power they have received to fulfill them. It is also a time of commitment," he said, "when we realize the importance of our task and go out to perform it."

He encouraged the congregation to exert the influence of friendliness, to seek out and accept the responsibility of presenting Jesus Christ to others, to please, and to dedicate themselves to the Great Master who is ever calling his followers on to greater crusades.

Worship, conducted by Mr. Hamilton, included a prayer of rededication of the church in which the congregation participated. Music was by the Junior and intermediate choirs with Miss Fay Milligan as organist. 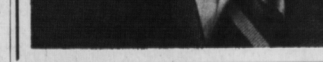
