MR. ROBERT FITZSIMMONS, of Summerside, attended the Bangor Exhibition, with his three horses—Island Chief, Dean Swift, and Dean Jr. One of the three—Dean Swift—started in the free-for-all; but owing to it is said, to the fact of his being "pulled" by his driver—a Bangor man—did not take a place.

NED HANLAN, the pacing horse owned by Mr. Hector McLeod, of St. Peter's Road, and which was to be one of the contestants in the pacing races at the Bangor exhibition, was dosed with croton-oil and severely injured about the head and face on the evening previous to the races. There is no clue to the perpetrator of the cowardly act.

The body of the late Chas. R. McNeill, the victim of the sad drowning accident at Georgetown on Wednesday the 8th inst., was yesterday taken to the home of his parents. The respect and esteem in which the deceased was held in this community was manifested by the number of people who accompanied his remains. Leading in the procession were the Georgetown volunteers, in which company he was a Corporal, and through the whole proceedings the well-known saying was verified, "One in whom mankind lost a friend and no one got rid of any enemy."

The annual general meeting of the Queen's Co. Rifle Association was held, as announced, in the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court Room last evening. There was not a very large attendance, and after the transaction of some other business the officers for the year were elected as follows:—

MR. J. F. POWERS arrived home from the Bangor Exhibition last evening. He took three fine animals—Mountain Girl, Topsy and Charley—with him and disposed of each at a good figure. Mountain Girl, which trotted a half mile trial heat in 1.18, and was much admired by competent judges, was sold to Mr. Samuel Sterns, of Bangor, a well-known horseman and owner of several "fast ones," among whom are Fanny Knox and Israel, the last named having, it is said, the fastest quarter record in the world. Topsy was purchased by Mr. C. W. Spratt, the proprietor of a livery stable in Bangor, and Charley was captured by Mr. W. S. Titcomb, also of Bangor. Mr. Powers corroborates the statements of other Islanders who took animals to Bangor, and says that he had to pay full fares both going and returning.

THERE was a large attendance of spectators at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon. The first case called was that of the ex-cavalry officer, charged with obtaining money under false pretences. Mr. J. J. Davies was again examined, but nothing important was elicited. Mr. F. L. Haszard applied for the discharge of the prisoner on the grounds (1) that his arrest was illegal; (2) that it had not been shown that the defendant, when he drew the check, was aware that it would not be paid; (3) that as the prosecutor had before obtained judgment for the same thing in a civil suit, showing that he did not believe there were any false pretences in the matter, he could not now bring a criminal action; (4) that the prosecutor admitted that he gave the defendant the money not only because he said he had funds in the bank but because of the company he kept. Mr. McLean on behalf of the prosecution, said that he did not wish to press the matter very hard, owing to the fact that the prisoner was to a large extent unacquainted with the language and customs of the place. His Honor said that he did not think the points raised by the prisoner's counsel sufficient to secure his discharge, and consequently, according to the evidence, he would be obliged to send him up for trial in the Supreme Court. The second case was that of a woman charged with violating the Scott Act. As it was proven that the woman was at the present time in Boston the case was adjourned for one week. The third case was also for violation of the Scott Act, and as the witnesses examined had all obtained liquor between the dates fixed in the summons, a fine of \$50 was imposed.

The Yacht Race Postponed.

New York, Sept. 9. There are plenty of disappointed yachtsmen in New York to-night, for the second race of the international series has been postponed till Saturday. After sailing in a fresh breeze from the eastward for four hours and a light breeze from the same quarter for about two hours more, the Mayflower and Galatea were enveloped in a thick fog ten miles east of Sandy Hook Lightship and were compelled to abandon the race. The Mayflower had outsailed the Galatea in every tack from the start, both carrying the same sail. The Mayflower could not have finished the race in the allotted time of seven hours even if the weather had remained clear.

Sad and Fatal Accident.

St. John, N. B., Sept. 10. Last evening a sad and fatal accident happened at Negrotown Point Breakwater. It appears that some heavy stones were being hoisted by the derrick, which broke, falling on a Norwegian workman named Nilson, killing him instantly. He was unmarried, and about 35 years of age. So far as can be ascertained he has no relatives in this country.

St. Stephens Wins the Horse-Race.

Houlton, Me., Sept. 9. The St. Stephen team won the horse-race with Houlton in one minute, three and a-half seconds; Houlton, one minute, three and three-quarter seconds. The St. Stephen team lost four seconds by Lindsay falling ten feet from the finish. He was in harness and had to be carried to the finish with the cart.

An American Opinion.

Washington, Sept. 9. A despatch says that Acting Attorney-General Jinks has given an opinion that when a vessel leaves one American port for another American port and stops temporarily at a Canadian port, she violates the law which subjects her to a penalty of two dollars for each passenger.

The Earthquake Sufferers.

New York, Sept. 9. Mayor Courtenay, of Charleston, telegraphs that in order to shelter the homeless people before cold weather sets in, from \$500,000 to \$700,000 is immediately required. The Mayor estimates the total damage to property by the earthquake at from \$5,000,000 to \$6,000,000.

Escaped from Jail.

Halifax, Sept. 9. Joseph Feener, under commitment to the Supreme Court for murdering an old man named O'Connell, by throwing him into a mill dam and allowing him to drown, has escaped from jail and probably sailed for Boston in a coasting schooner.

Fishery Notes.

Halifax, Sept. 9. The American schooner Pearl, Nilson, seized by the Customs, has been released, she depositing \$200, half the fine. The Capt. of the steamer Novelty has gone home to Portland. He says there's nothing but tinkers in the North Bay.

Fatal Stabbing Affray.

Halifax, Sept. 9. A young man named John McLellan was stabbed and instantly killed at Weyecoomagh last night by another young man named Alexander McDonald. The murderer escaped.
