Milwaukee Regains Lead By Beating Dodgers 8-7

Milwaukee's Braves, refusing to choke up in the clutch, scrambled back into an undisputed lead in the mid-pac National League race Wednesday, ending Brooklyn's overnight taste of first place with an 8-7 victory over the Dodgers.

It was the final meeting of the season between the two contenders and gave the Braves a 12-10 edge in the series while hoisting them into a one-game lead again.

Third-place Cincinnati slipped three games back as Lefty Johnny Antonelli kept the Redlegs' power under wraps with a three-hitter in an 8-0 victory by the New York Giants.

OTHER ACTION
In American League day games, Boston's Red Sox replaced Chicago in third place with a 4-1 victory over the White Sox, and Detroit won its sixth in a row with a 3-2 decision over Washington.

Billy Bruton, batting .308 with only 46 runs batted in and Joe Adcock, who has bullied Brooklyn all year, drove in five runs against them as the Braves spotted the Dodgers a 3-0 lead and then twice hustled back to snap ties to win. Bruton peppered a two-run triple that got rid of starter Don Newcombe in a four-inning second, and then singled Adcock home with the run that broke a 7-3 tie in the eighth.

Adcock, batting at a near 300 clip against the Brooks, walloped his 37th home run to break a 4-4 tie in the sixth inning. It was his 13th against Brooklyn this season — matching the league mark for homers against one club set by Chicago's Hank Bauer against Pittsburgh in 1954.

USE IT PITCHERS
Newcombe, a 32-game winner, was just another pitcher in this one as the two clubs used 11 hurlers, six of them Dodgers. Lefty Burdette, with an 18-9 mark, didn't finish the first inning for the Braves and it was Bob Buhl who finally won it, becoming the third man ever to defeat the Dodgers eight times in one season. Roger Craig lost it.

Antonelli faced only 29 men, struck out three and didn't walk a man while beating the Redlegs. Jackie Brandt, replacing a cold-struck Willie Mays in centre field for the Giants, hit his 10th homer in the first inning off loser Joe Nuxhall and Darvyl Spencer socked a two-run, inside-the-park homer in the fourth.

The only hits off Antonelli, who won his 16th, were singles. Two walks, one hit and an error

by third baseman Harmon Killebrew gave the Tigers a ninth-inning run that beat the Senators and gave Billy Hoelt his 16th victory.

The Red Sox walloped it hits, one a 19th homer by Jackie Jensen who had two runs batted in, while Frank Sullivan held Chicago to five hits for his 13th victory. Chicago Cubs are Pittsburgh in National League night action while the New York Yankees played at Kansas City and Baltimore was at Cleveland in American League games under the lights.

KANSAS CITY (AP)—The inevitable happened Wednesday night when the Kansas City Athletics defeated the New York Yankees, 7-4 for their first victory over the league leaders here this season.

Louis Skizas and Eddie Robinson hit home runs to account for five of the A's runs.

CLEVELAND (AP)—Early Wynn pitched a seven-hitter and clouted his first home run of the year to give the Cleveland Indians a 2-1 American League victory over the Baltimore Orioles Wednesday night. Wynn needed help in the ninth from Don Mossi, who came in with the bases loaded and one out and retired the last two batters.

Cleveland's first run came on Vic Vercy's 28th homer of the year, a record high for the big first baseman who was benched by polo at the end of last season. Wynn's smash over the right field fence in the sixth inning broke a 1-1 tie and gave the 36-year-old righthander his 28th victory, and a 17-9 record this season.

Baltimore scored in the fourth when Dick Williams singled, was sacrificed to second, and came in on a single by George Kell. Skiny Brown, handed his fifth defeat against nine victories, held the Indians to five hits. Mike Forriex retired the Tribe in order in the last two innings.

TKO's SAXTON IN 9th

Carmen Basilio Retains World Welter Ch'ship

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP) — Carmen Basilio split Johnny Saxton's lip and raked his body and head with wicked punches Wednesday night to recapture the world welterweight title on a technical knockout in 1:31 of the ninth round of a bloody rout at War Memorial Auditorium.

The craggy-faced ex-marine from nearby Canastota knelt and blessed himself in mid-ring after referee Al Beri stopped the uneven struggle with Saxton staggering along the ropes near a neutral corner.

Tears flowed from Carmen's eyes as he tasted ample revenge for the loss of his title at Chicago last March 14 when he claimed he was "robbed."

It was a one-sided bout with Basilio dominating the action as he drove the out-gunned Saxton from corner to corner.

All three officials had it 7-1 in favor of Basilio after eight rounds each giving the second to the 26-year-old New Yorker. The AP card also was 7-1.

Basilio punished Saxton's body with searing punches and shook him up as early as the fourth. It was the Basilio of old, ever-charging onward and shifting his fire from body to head as the opening developed.

A long right to the jaw staggered Saxton at the one minute mark of the ninth and he almost went down. Sensing the kill, the 29-year-old Basilio slammed Saxton into a neutral corner and rocked him with a hurricane of blows.

When Saxton finally escaped from that onslaught, he ran head on into another furious storm as Basilio chased him into the opposite neutral corner. Saxton gave way and was crouching along the ropes in the direction of Basilio's corner when referee Beri stepped between them.

Robboro, 24-year-old catcher who had belted 25 homers while the Royals were heading for their fourth-place finish, broke a 1-1 deadlock Montreal had made with a run in the sixth after Toronto had taken a 1-0 lead in the first.

Righthander Billy Harris, 24-year-old native of Dorchester, N.B., spaced eight hits while striking out five and walking three to best Lynn Lovenguth, the league's most valuable pitcher, for the victory. Lovenguth, touched for seven hits, struck out eight and didn't walk a man.

Harris posted an 11-11 record during the regular season while Lovenguth had a 24-12 mark, the most wins of any pitcher in the league.

Harris also collected three of Montreal's seven hits.
