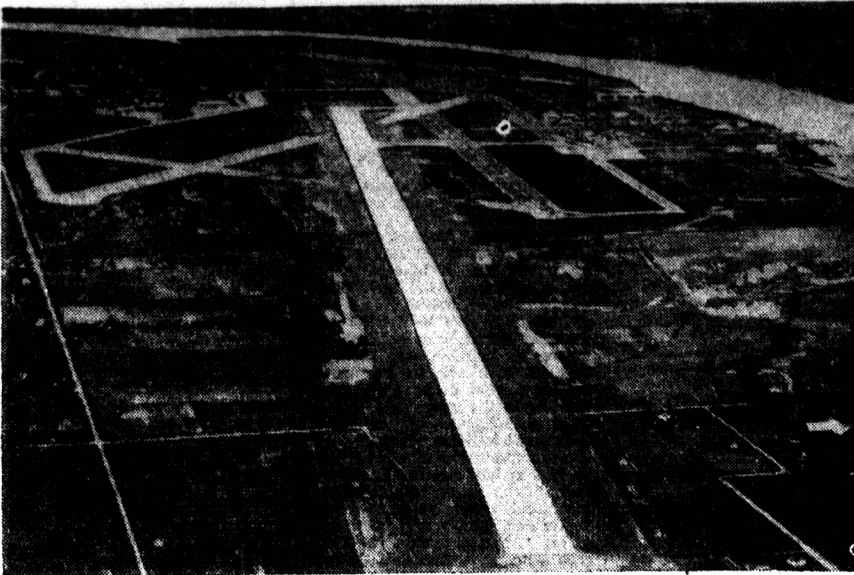

New York Stocks

NEW YORK, (AP) — Timidity and doubt went hand and hand in the stock market last week. Prices suffered.

It is quite well agreed throughout Wall Street that a long-term deflationary trend could well be the direction of the U. S. economy. And the stock market could march along a parallel declining path.

Wall street gave voice to its doubts when Chrysler Corp., the U. S.'s fifth largest industrial enterprise, felt it was necessary to cut prices \$100 each on all its models. So far, no other motor maker has followed suit.

Volume for the week came to 9,677,000, second highest of the year.

Willys-Overland topped the most active issues on the New York stock exchange with 250,700 shares traded in the week. It closed up 7-8 at 14 7/8.

Chrysler, incidentally, was the only loser in the 10 most active issues. It was off 2 5/8 on the week at 84, ninth most active.

On the American stock exchange the week's most active issue was Sapphire Petroleum up 3-16 at 2 7/8 with 283,200 shares traded. It was followed by Kaiser-Frazer up 1-2 at 5 1/2.

Canadian stocks were higher Friday. Dome Mines and International Nickel each advanced 1-8. Distillers Seagram gained 3-8 and Hiram Walker was up 1-2. McIntyre lost 1-8 and Canadian Pacific eased 1-4.

On the American stock exchange Giant Yellowknife added 1-8. Royalite Oil was ahead 1-4 and Lake Shore was not quoted.

U. S. Steel

CLEVELAND, (AP) — Steel production in March will hit 10,000,000 tons for the first time in history, Steele Magazine says Sunday.

The trade magazine reports the output of steel for castings and ingots has exceeded 100 per cent throughout the month but said high production cannot take all of the credit. It pointed out that expansion of the industry also has played a large part.

Steel says the mills ran to 10 per cent of capacity last week and turned out 2,277,000 net tons of steel for ingots and castings.

The automobile industry was listed by the magazine as one consumer "still pushing hard to get steel." A strengthening demand from household appliance makers and farm implement manufacturers also is noted.

ANNAPOLIS ROYAL, N. S. OP—A meeting of the historical association here heard a request for marking the site of the first grain mill in North America. Arthur Kelsall, president, said the mill established at L'Equille in 1608 also marked the first mechanical industry on this continent.

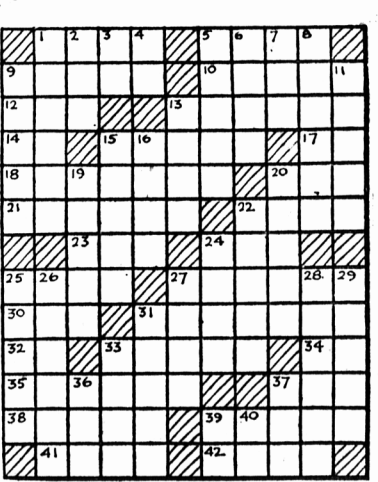
SMART GARDENER
