

## Paving Project At Morell Being Completed Today

The village of Morell will have four new paved streets today when the firm of Matheson and MacNeil complete the laying of the final coat of chips. Approximately a mile or more of new paving was laid yesterday, which included the four streets, the longest stretch being the one on the Byrne Road. This may well be considered a major project for the village of Morell, and one certainly to receive the full support of all the citizens since these streets are well travelled ones, and in the late fall and early spring present a rather difficult condition for pedestrian traffic.

It is possible that a further program may be carried out at a later time. However, at the moment four new paved streets is a considerable undertaking, and further paving must await satisfactory financial conditions. At all events the new streets have been paved for the convenience of the people of Morell primarily and those of the surrounding districts, and it is assured that they will be in perfect accord with this new program.

## Contract Is Let For New Montague Dock And Slip

Messrs. A.B. Cutcliffe and Son and John Quinn, all of Charlottetown have received the contract to construct a dock and slip between the Stevens wharf and the Government wharf at Montague. The work of constructing the new wharf will be immediately undertaken, it was learned yesterday.

The wharf will be constructed with three rows of piles, cross stringers, walings and plank facing. The slip will be approximately 18 feet wide permitting the drawing in of any boat using the dock area. With its completion, requiring an estimated two months, there will be complete warfage on the south side docking area, which will be of considerable advantage not only to the vessels during the shipping season, but also to the lobster fishermen who use this port

as home base for their boats. Mr. Henry Munroe, who has had considerable experience in the construction of wharves, has been appointed inspector for the work.

### Red Cross Home Nursing Classes Start

Red Cross Home nursing got underway in two communities last week when thirty-five women enrolled in two courses organized at North River and North Rustico. Eleven members of North River Women's Institute attended classes given in the teaching room at Red Cross Headquarters. The North Rustico ladies organized in their own community and attend classes given in Stella Maris Church hall every Friday night.

The twelve week course, consisting of weekly lessons includes demonstrations and practice periods centering around the care of the sick person in the home. General topics include symptoms of illness, temperature taking and thermometer reading, pulse and respiration, making a patient comfortable in bed, bed-making, bed bath and general bed care.

Further courses will be organized at the Society's headquarters during October, and groups or women interested may enroll by phoning the Red Cross.

## Montague Town Council Debates Financial Problem At Meeting Last Evening

A special meeting of the Montague Town Council was held last evening to consider the town tax assessment and the tax rate. Mayor B. H. Yeo presided over the meeting, and present were Councilors McGowan, Greene, Reynolds, Clements and Nicholson.

The town clerk, Mr. G. Arnold Wightman, explained that the real estate assessment last year was \$655,600, and this year was \$686,400. The personal property assessment last year was \$469,200, and this year was \$492,100. He continued by stating that the total revenue last year was approximately \$8,000.00, and would not be a great deal higher this year.

After considerable discussion the following rates were moved: Real estate — 80 cents — unchanged. Personal property — 30 cents, up 10 cents. Pool tax on real estate owners — 5.00, up 3.00. Poll tax on non-real estate owners — 10.00, up 8.00. Lots and farms — 80 cents, up 30 cents. Non-resident permanent employee working tax — \$10.00, up 5.00. This new scale will add approximately \$1,000.00 to the revenue for a total of \$9,000.00.
