

The Halifax Reporter says:—We learn that the shore fishery has been very productive this season, which is a great boon to our hardy fishermen on the coast.

There is such a marked difference in the cost of trying and convicting Fenians in Toronto and in Quebec, that the Toronto Globe suggests to the Dominion Government, that a reasonable reward be offered to the Fenians to make their arrangements for their next raid, so as to be caught in the Province of Quebec rather than in Ontario, as thereby a saving will be effected to the Dominion Treasury.

Mr. Geo. W. MILLNER, of this city, has invented a Double Grain Sowing Machine, which promises to be of great utility to the farmers of this Island. On Thursday last it was tested in a field belonging to Mr. Davies. There was but one slight defect in it, which Mr. Miller is now engaged in remedying. The machine is seven feet in width, and adjusts itself to the inequalities of the ground.

The Drum-Major, in presenting the donation, made a handsome speech, to which Mrs. Penny replied in fitting terms.

The Halifax Reporter, which is always in advance of its contemporaries in procuring news, says that the Nova Scotia Repeal Delegates left Liverpool, G. B., on the 6th instant, on their return home. Mr. Howe remains behind on private business. The question of Repeal has been postponed by the Imperial Parliament for three months.

ALONZO McCORMICK, a Newark saddler, aged 24, murdered his wife, aged 18, in Brooklyn recently, by shooting her through the head with a pistol. He immediately attempted to kill himself also, by firing a pistol at his heart, which he barely missed, so that he lived some hours afterward.

The wife of Whelan, the supposed assassin of Mr. McGee, visited her husband at the jail in Ottawa, a few days ago. She says she will engage counsel for her husband. The fee demanded by Mr. Hilliard Cameron was spoken of. She thought even \$500 would be a great deal to pay. She evidently thinks much of Whelan.

BITTEN last week, was worth from thirty to forty cents a pound in Halifax, and scarce at that. Potatoes, we learn, have fallen to thirty-seven cents a bushel. In the Charlottetown market all sorts of provisions have experienced a sudden downfall in prices; for details of which we refer the curious to market prices, published on our first page.

It is said that Grant is to run, to give prestige to the ticket, but he is pledged not to qualify for President. This leaving a vacancy, puts the Vice in, and keeps Grant where he is, to be at the head of the army for life. Colfax is really to be the President if the ticket wins a majority of the electoral college.

By direction of the President of the United States, a gold watch, suitably inscribed, was forwarded in January last, to Capt. Michael Carroll, of Windsor, N. S., as an appreciation of his humane services in rescuing the crew of the American brig Orison, of Portland, Me., in the fall of 1865.

Thatcher, the New York prophet, says that June will have more pleasant days than May—a safe prediction, for it could not well have been less—but that the three summer months will be showery. He promises three pleasant autumn months.

Police Magistrate McNab, of Toronto, delivered a temperance lecture at London, lately in which he stated that "there were plenty of drunken doctors in Toronto, but the lawyers of Hamilton and Toronto were among the most intemperate of the community."

The English Steamer—nearly a week behind time—arrived at Halifax at 8 o'clock on Monday evening. The mail for this Island was forwarded on Tuesday morning, and was received at the Charlottetown Post Office at 5 o'clock the same evening.

ONE of the latest sensations is the offer, for a considerable bet, of a Yankee maniac, who has acquired a reputation as a skater, to float down the Falls of Niagara this summer in an India-rubber boat, which is now being constructed.

GALBRAITH'S Band plays on Hillsborough Square at seven o'clock every Thursday evening, to an admiring crowd of both sexes. The Police should be on the ground to prevent the growing ruffianism noticeable among the boys.

The "California fever" has broken out in Nova Scotia, and numbers of young men are leaving their homes to seek their fortunes in the "golden State." The Halifax Chronicle recommends them to stay at home, as they may go further and fare worse.

They are about to try a curious case in Paris. A would-be suicide, who had not sufficient courage to perform the fatal act, hired a friend to blow out his brains for twenty francs. It is to be tested whether this was murder or not.

MURPHY, the Anti-Popery Champion, has excited further riots at Ashton-under-Lyne and Staley Bridge, England. Several Catholic Churches and private buildings were sacked and demolished before the military could put a stop to the disgraceful proceedings.

SHEDDER rifles will be distributed among the best shots of the Provinces, in order that they may practise for the match to come off at Montreal, under the auspices of the Dominion Rifle Association, in September next. The prizes will range as high as \$500.

It is rumored that there were three attempts at incendiarism in Charlottetown, on Saturday night—one on the tenement premises of the late Mr. Harris, Pownall Street, and the other on the premises of Mr. Barnstead, baker, Sydney Street.

The steamer City of Cork, of the Inman line, with European mails for Halifax, &c., broke her shaft after being out some four days from Queenstown, and had to put back. This will cause a delay of some days in the receipt of the English Mail for this Island.

Dr. FORNESTER, Principal of the Truro Normal School, paid our City a visit last week. He has recently had issued an Educational work which is highly spoken of by the press.

The Toronto Telegraph says that the Imperial Government will refuse its guarantee for the Inter-colonial Railroad, unless Canada increases the amount by five millions of dollars.

TURNER, one of the witnesses against Whelan, was inveigled from a dance one night lately at Ottawa, and nearly murdered. Others of the witnesses have received threatening letters.

Besides twenty million bushels of wheat, California will raise twelve and a half million bushels of barley and oats this year, but does not know where the ships to bring it to market are coming from.

It is said that the leaders of the Fenian conspiracy determined at the time of the execution of the murderers of the unfortunate Brett, to take the lives of four of the members of the Royal Family, to 'pay for' the 'murder' of the Fenian 'martyrs,' and that Prince Alfred is one of the four thus doomed. Intelligence of this atrocious and nefarious telegraphed to Mr. Gayther Hardy by a person who had accidentally learned the fact a short time after the execution had taken place; and it may well be feared that the abominable attempt on the life of Prince Alfred will not be the last endeavour of the miscreants to carry out their diabolical programme. One must hope that subsequent attacks, if made, will be frustrated as this one happily has been.

The latest intelligence from Mexico, is that the Government of Juarez, the murderer of Maximilian, is tottering to its fall—that the revolution in favor of General Ortega is assuming formidable dimensions. It is, however, almost impossible to believe any reports coming from that country, for they are proverbially unreliable. Only a short time since it was announced that the insurrection had been almost completely suppressed in every province where it had existed.

Reverdy Johnston for Minister to England, Mr. Groesbeck for Secretary of the Treasury, and Stanbery for Attorney General, are the Cabinet changes talked of at Washington.

The ceremony of strewing flowers on the graves of the Union soldiers, was observed on Saturday week last throughout the Union. It was entered into with great enthusiasm in the North.

MANY of our readers will regret to hear that F. P. Norton, Esq., of Georgetown, died very suddenly on Thursday evening last. Apoplexy, we hear, was the immediate cause of his death.

The Islander of Friday last, in stripping to the task of inquiring into the causes of the present "hard times," indulges in exaggeration. We reserve our remarks on this subject for another No.

The Montrealer devotes five columns of its space to an account of the religious ceremony which took place in the chapel of the Tuilleries, on the occasion of the Prince Imperial receiving his first communion.

A monster ox, weighing twenty-seven hundred pounds, was on exhibition in St. John, N. B., a few days ago. The animal was raised near Sussex Vale, and was sold for \$225.

Will the City Fathers inform us why the street corners cannot be cleared of the gangs of loafers who infest them on Sundays, to the annoyance of all peace-loving citizens.

SHIP NEWS.—The Bark Western Queen, Lea, master, from Bristol arrived at Port Hill, on the 29th ult., with Goods, to Messrs. James Yeo & Sons, and Captains and crews for five new vessels.

The Hon. John Hamilton Gray, of St. John, N. B., has been gazetted Arbitrator for the Dominion of Canada, under the British North American Act.

The youngest son of Governor Musgrave, of Newfoundland, aged eighteen years, died at St. John's, N. F., on the 7th ult.

The contract for carrying Her Majesty's mails between England and Halifax, has again been awarded to the Inman Steamship Company, for a term of three years.

The weather has been decidedly juicy for the last two or three days. The grass, however, is wonderfully improved thereby.

Several cases of small-pox have been discovered among the passengers arriving at New York from Europe.

A MYSTERIOUS CIRCUMSTANCE.—A Quebec paper, speaking of the wreck last fall of the ship "Woodstock," states that an inquest was held on Tuesday upon the body of the captain, which was found shortly after the accident, but kept during the winter, and has been brought to Quebec. The autopsy, conducted by Drs. Lane and Sewell, revealed the fact that the throat had been cut, but that the deceased could not have committed suicide unless he was left-handed. It is hoped that that circumstance may lead to the knowledge of the cause of the death of Captain Caswell.—Montreal Witness.
