LATEST NEWS.

NEW YORK, Oct. 31.

THE Steamship 'City of Boston' arrived at New York, on the 31st October, with dates to the 19th ultimo.

LORD PALMERSTON IS DEAD.

He was seriously ill for some days, from the effects of a cold, but his symptoms were not considered alarming until the 17th. He would have completed his 81st year on the 20th October. He died at 9-30, on the morning of the 18th.

The death of the Premier caused a profound feeling of regret among all parties. Business was generally suspended.

Earl Russell will probably succeed him, Earl Clarendon taking the Foreign Office, but nothing official has transpired.

Assassination of the Governor of Jamaica.

By the Steamer from Pictou this morning, we learn that a Telegram was received by a gentleman in Pictou last evening, announcing the startling intelligence that GENERAL LEARY, Commander-in-Chief of the Forces, and Governor of Jamaica, had been murdered by the Natives.

The Mutiny at Jamaica.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.

A Committee from the Fenian Senate visited Washington yesterday to thank the President for releasing John Mitchell.

The Express says:—Havanna advices confirm the accounts of a mutiny at Jamaica. Many revolting murders have been committed. A white Magistrate has been killed, his fingers and toes were cut off, and his bowels ripped open by a negro woman. The greatest alarm prevailed among the whites, and the mutiny was spreading.
