

# NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

## CANADIAN.

TORONTO, Sept. 14.

The *Globe* this morning has the following special cable despatch dated London, Sept. 13: According to a circular from a continental financial agency, quoted by the London papers the Canadian Pacific Railway Syndicate is composed, in addition to Messrs. Morton, Rose & Co., London, of Messrs. J. S. Kenedy & Co., New York, and La Societe Generale, Paris.

## EUROPEAN.

RAGUSA, Sept. 14.

It is definitely known that Riza Pasha, the Turkish commander, has orders not to resist the Montenegrin occupation of Dulcigno, though at the same time it is left to his discretion whether to prevent the Albanians from interfering. He has halted his force where it cannot be of the slightest use, while simultaneously Albanian volunteers are flooding through Scutari for Tietzi. Five thousand men are assembled there, of whom 3,000 are reported to be Turkish regulars.

It is now known that the British Admiral has orders not to disembark his men. There is considerable excitement in Dulcigno among the Albanian Mahometans. It is expected that a vessel will shortly be sent as a refuge for the families of both Christian and Mahometan inhabitants who are hemmed in between the Albanians and Montenegrins.

CAPE TOWN, September 13, }  
via NEW YORK, Sept. 14. }

The Cape mounted rifles have occupied Mafeteng and Mosseni. The collision with the Basutos was brief.

Several farwell addresses have been presented to Sir Bartle Frere, who sails for England on the 15th.

LONDON, Sept. 14.

A substance supposed to be dynamite was found on the North Western Railway. It was near but not under the rail.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 14.

It is not yet possible to tell what effect the change in the Ministry will have.

The *Times* correspondent at Vienna thinks that the change will tend to the settlement of the Montenegrin question.

VIENNA, Sept. 14.

According to intelligence from an independent source in St. Petersburg, reported defeat of a portion of the Russian force by the Turcomans is untrue.

LONDON, Sept. 14.

The "Messenger de Athens" says the Minister of War has opened a new credit of 1,800,000 francs for war material, and the Minister of Marine has ordered ten Krupp cannon for gunboats.

## UNITED STATES.

BOSTON, Sept. 14.

The latest returns from Maine show that the Fusionists have carried three Congressional districts. The Governorship is still in doubt, with the chances in favor of Plaised (Fusionist) being elected by a small majority. The Legislature is probably Republican on a joint ballot.

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.

The *Times* says: "The condition between the Democrats and Greenbackers in Maine has achieved a degree of success which will surprise even its friends in other States. The Democrats will, however, very naturally claim that the advantage is substantially theirs, and will make the most of it in reviving the Hancock boom. The result is disgraceful to the people of Maine."

LOUISVILLE, Sept. 14.

L. Burkhardt, a travelling Philadelphia salesman, got off a train yesterday, while stopping on a bridge, supposing he was in a depot. He fell seventy-five feet below and was horribly crushed. Death was instantaneous.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 14.

At a meeting of merchants and property owners, to-day, a committee of thirty was appointed to obtain, if possible, another enumeration of the population by the government.

BOSTON, Sept. 14.

Latest reports from Maine indicate Plaised's majority as certain. No change in Congressional delegation. Legislature is Republican.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.

The State Department has not received any official notification of acceptance by Chili of mediation of United States.

WORCESTER, Mass., Sept. 14.

The interest in the Republican State Convention, to be held here to-morrow, is not as great as last year as there is to be no contest; it being conceded that the present State Officers, save the Treasurer—who is ineligible to a re-election, will be nominated. The nomination for Treasurer will be tendered, without doubt, to Daniel B. Gleason, of Medford, Deputy Tax Commissioner. For electors at large, Paul A. Ghabourne of Williamstown, and John M. Forbes, of Milton, will probably be selected.

PORTLAND, Sept. 14.

Latest returns from the counties thus far show that the Legislature stands: Senate—Republicans, 18; Fusion, 13. House—Republicans, 89; Fusion, 62.

GLOUCESTER, Sept. 14.

Arrived, schooner Laura Sayward, with captain and mate of British schooner Maggie Blanche, of and from Digby, N. S., for Barbadoes, waterlogged, abandoned 9th inst. The owner, W. K. Rice, was drowned in the cabin, and William Vroom, one of the crew, and August Theodore, the cook, were also drowned.

It is now believed by those interested that the last Will will be proved beyond a doubt, after which the body of the late Wm. Gammell will be exhumed.

PERSONAL.—The Reverend Patrick Doyle P. P., of Summerside, Prince Edward Island, is in town and is staying at Henchey's Hotel. The remains of the deceased were interred in the Camp-Hill Cemetery.
