MONTREAL, Aug. 15.

Mr. S. J. Meany left New York on Tuesday to take a position as candidate of the Irish National Party for the seat vacated by the death of Sir Coleman Lagan, late member for the County Clare, Ireland.

The Dominion Board of Trade members leave on Saturday for Milwaukee, to attend the National Board of Trade meeting.

Civil Rights Alliance is taking steps to bail the Indians now under commitment for the recent Oka outrages.

The Vice-Regal party leave Winnipeg to-day for St. Andrews, Selkirk and St. Peters; from thence they will visit the Mennonite settlement.

WAR DISPATCHES.

(Special Dispatch to Daily Examiner.)

London, Aug. 15.

The recent operations in the south of the Balkans have inflicted a loss of twelve thousand on the Russians.

They are now driven from all places south of the Balkans.

Germany has remonstrated against Turkish atrocities and intimated to the Porte the absolute necessity of discipline.

Athens has decided to undertake naval preparations and will ask special credit for the purpose.

WAR NEWS.

London, Aug. 14.

Further Russian massacres are reported. On withdrawing from the cantons of Chourkal and Zaruskal the enemy destroyed everything in his retreat—houses, plantations and farms—leaving the population in a dreadful state of destitution, without food or shelter.

The Russians took as prisoners to Alexander the wife and children of Yousef Bey, and Caimacan of Chourkal his brother, Mehmet Bey and his children, and finally the female servants of Caimacan of Chourkal. The prisoners, after having suffered every outrage, are at present on their way to Tiflis.

The Russians have adopted general and uniform system to seize defenceless villages, and after destroying them with cannon shot to massacre the unarmed inhabitants, and carry off women for the purpose of outrage—when they are not killed first. Russians threaten Christian villages with the same fate if they do not surrender, or if their inhabitants refuse to be enrolled.

The "News" correspondent says the following he received from the fugitives: The day the Russians evacuated Eski Saghra, the Turks ordered all Christians, men, women and children, to be shot as they left their houses. Those who remained within were burnt alive.

An order was given to burn down and destroy every particle of Christian property in the place. Many leading Turkish merchants took part in the affair.

A large number of Bashi Bazouks raided the Tehripan district, one of the richest in that part of Turkey. It contains a large proportion of Christian inhabitants, over thirty churches, and five hundred schools and colleges, all of which were burned; also the villages of Boghtian, Mahalesi, Rani, and many of others, in all about sixty, containing from 150 to 200 families each. Scarcely fifty persons escaped.

Bulgarian fugitives at Gibrova and Selvi estimate from twelve to fifteen thousand Christians were massacred in Esthai, Saghra and Tehripan districts alone.

GENERAL NEWS.

London, Aug. 14.

Hobart Pasha has improvised a jetty, by mooring small vessels lengthwise, and people and cattle are walking aboard the vessels.

It is reported that all men who participated in insurrection are sent to Siberia, and the women and children given to Cossacks.

A Calcutta despatch says during the week insufficient rain has fallen in portions of Madras and Mysore. It is now clear that the famine will rage with increased intensity in those provinces, for at least six months longer.

The Paris Monitor says the question of state of siege has never been discussed or raised in Cabinet; that there never existed either on this or any other question any division within Cabinet; that the most perfect understanding always existed between Duke de Broglie and M. Fourtin; that neither German nor any other government made any representations on presence of Duke de Broglie at head of Cabinet; and that President is firmly resolved to retain ministry of 16th of May until the elections.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 14.

A German colony has, through Prince of Reuss, German Ambassador, asked the Porte for authorization to form a sort of municipal guard for self protection.

A majority of police having been drafted to the army, those remaining are insufficient to preserve order.
