King's County Fish, Game Ass'n Annual Meeting

The meeting was presided over by the past president, Judge J. S. DesRoches of Montague. Other officers for the ensuing year include: Vice president, Aldius MacKenzie, Morell; secretary-treasurer, Neil MacDonald, Souris.

Montague Announces Coronation Day Plans

The program for Coronation Day has been announced by Judge J. S. DesRoches, chairman of the Coronation committee.

In the early afternoon a free show for all school children will be held at Yeo's Theatre beginning at 1:30 p.m.

At 3:15 the parade will form at the Legion home where it will be assembled by parade marshal Roddy Martin. The parade will be led by the pipers, followed by the Montague detachment of the R.C.M.P., the Legionnaires, service personnel, Girl Guides and Boy Scouts, Ladies' Auxiliary of the Legion, and other organizations.

Following the parade through the main street, all will assemble at the school grounds where a raised platform has been erected. There, the parade will be joined by school children and the general public. Each group will have a designated area on the grounds which will be allocated upon arrival.

On the platform will be members of the town council, clergy, men, and political representatives.

The introductory "O Canada," His Worship, Mayor B. H. Yeo will officially open the celebration with an address. A pipe selection will follow.

At 4:00 p.m. the address of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Second will be heard over the public address system. Three cheers and the singing of "God Save the Queen" will close the celebration.

In the evening a fireworks display beginning at 8:30 p.m. will be held in the school grounds specially prepared for the entertainment of children on this memorable occasion. In the morning, children will also be given flags and memorial medallions to remember the occasion.

It was announced Thursday that the members of the fire department would be called on to decorate the main street of the town and this together with the decorations on business houses and private homes should make the town look even more lovely on the day of the coronation of the gracious Queen.
