Atlantic Pact Airmen To Arrive At S'ide
The first detachment of members of the air forces of Atlantic Pact nations to be trained at the Air Navigation School of the R. C. A. F. at Summerside will arrive over the week end, 19 in all. The group is composed as follows: Six Norwegians, six Belgians, seven Italians.

They will be followed later in the fall by a larger group from the French air force. These men will take the same course as do the R. C. A. F. trainees which consists of 36 weeks of basic navigational training and, at the end of that time they will be presented with their air navigator's wings. At the same time as these men are being trained as navigators others are receiving pilot and radio officer training at the R. C. A. F. schools at Trenton and Clinton, Ontario. Before coming here and to the other schools they have undergone a period of training at the R. C. A. F. Station at London, Ont. where among other things they were given, if needed, a better command of English and some instruction on local customs.—S.
