# Red Schoendienst Names Own Terms For '59 Pact

ST. LOUIS (AP)—"Red told us what he wanted and we gave it to him."  
Birdie Tobbetts, executive vice-president of the National Baseball League pennant-winning Milwaukee Braves, had just signed their great second baseman, Red Schoendienst, for the 1959 season.  
Even though the popular 35-year-old infielder lay propped up in a hospital bed with tuberculosis he was told to name his own terms.

Despite Red's rapid progress since his illness was discovered a few months ago they doubt he will be on the field this season.  
Said Braves general manager John Quinn:  
"All we can say is a prayer that Schoendienst's health will be 100 per cent again. What we want first is to see Red in perfect health and let baseball follow that."  
The contract business was settled in a matter of minutes after Tobbetts and Quinn entered the hospital room.  
Red reportedly will get close to his 1958 salary, estimated at between \$30,000 and \$35,000.  
Red, who entered Mount St. Rose Hospital two months ago Monday, appeared strong and healthy.

He broke into the National League 14 years ago, and will be 36 in a few weeks. He played for St. Louis, the old New York Giants and the Braves. Last year his hitting slumped to .262 after a .309 mark in 1957.

Right now Aces are too strong for the rest of the league and it's to the Aces' advantage as well that the league tighten up. Summerside folks like a winner but they are not going to like one that well that they'll continue turning out regardless of how badly the Aces lay over the rest of the field. Those western folks sure want to see those Aces come out on top but they want a few bitter battles to make the going that much more interesting.  
Right now, they may get more interesting battles when Charlottetown teams invade Civic Stadium. The Royals are showing signs of being much tougher and Navy, with these additions, are certainly a greater threat.  
Tonight Navy has the big chance they are after. They could be the first crew to put a stop to these victory marches of the Aces.  
We'll know better this time tomorrow.

TORONTO MAPLE LEAFS have a great chance this week to vacate the cellar of the National Hockey League. They play two home games before they go visiting to Boston Gardens on Sunday night.

Right now, they have 35 points, one less than Boston Bruins who are in fifth place. On Wednesday Leafs play the only scheduled game and that's at Maple Leaf Gardens with the third place New York Rangers. A win for the Imlach-Olmedast boys would lift them into fifth place and only three points back of Phil Watson's charges. Both Leafs and Rangers have played an identical number of games. After Wednesday night, Bruins will have played one more than Leafs and New York.  
The Detroit Red Wings are at present in fourth spot and they would be mighty happy if they were sure of still being there come play-off time. The Wings have not been flying very high of late. In fact, they have been just about grounded. If the Toronto club conquers New York tomorrow night, then the Wings will find the Leafs just one point back. However, Detroit will have a game in hand and by the looks of things now, they are certainly going to need it.

THURSDAY BRINGS another single game—the National Hockey League. It will be Detroit at Boston and brother that's a big one for both clubs. A Boston win would tie them with the Wings and make certain of being out of the cellar, regardless of the outcome of Wednesday's game in Toronto. A Detroit win would be a bitter blow to Boston's playoff hopes.

FOLLOWERS OF these Chicago Black Hawks (and there are a lot of them these days) were mighty disappointed about what happened to them over the weekend. The Hawks failed to pick up a single point, losing to Canadiens in Montreal and blowing a 3-1 lead to New York Rangers on Sunday night.

Chicago's birds were really winging until this past weekend and both losses were really tough. Dickie Moore spoiled the Hawks' invasion of Montreal Forum (it was a 1-0 hockey game) and three third period goals made New York tie the victory at Chicago. The Hawks are still in second place, three points up on the Rangers. The Rangers, however, have a game in hand and they'll get that one in Wednesday night at Toronto. Naturally the Hawks will be real Toronto backers for this one. If Toronto can beat the Rangers the Hawks' three point margin over the Rangers will still be intact.

JOHNNY BOWER was one of Saturday night's three stars as the Leafs walloped Boston Bruins 4-1. Johnny was sensational in that Toronto cage and those Toronto fans really appreciated his great effort.

You would think that after such a display, he would have been in the nets the next night in Detroit. But no sir, there was Chadwick as big as life. Leafs had a 3-0 lead in that game and blew it. They were in front 6-4 in the final session and the best they could muster was a 6-6 tie. Perhaps Chadwick was in good form. And then perhaps he wasn't. But why bench a fellow like Bower when he is producing so magnificently?

But the story is going, the rounds that the Tars are desperately repeating the leaks suffered in that terrible squall in Summerside, and that they will be a much more formidable outfit than they were at Civic Stadium. All island hockey fans, even the most rabid Ace rooters, will hope that this is so. The Navy boys came off the deck to battle out a victory earlier in the season, and they might do it again.  
But it is the Parkdale Royals who battle the Aces in Summerside on Friday evening that the experts and fans (who are probably just as expert in this prophesying game as the experts), firmly believe will give the high-flying Summerside squad the most trouble. True, the Aces beat Parkdale 11-2 the last time out, but since that game they've acquired Alie Carver and, Bellevance (doesn't anyone know this boy's first name?) an offensive and defensive threat respectively that cannot be taken too lightly.

The challenger was able to stand off London's wild rushes while scoring heavily with his left.  
At the end of the 14th round, a puzzled and bewildered London patted Cooper on the shoulder and held his hands up, apparently thinking the fight was over. That was a measure of the damage done by Cooper's accurate left.  
The winner could be in line for great things in the middle-heavyweight situation. Floyd Patterson, the world champ, has been considering a defence against Ingemar Johansson of Sweden, the European king, or Cooper. There have been reports that a Patterson-Cooper fight might be staged in Colorado Springs, Colo. However, Jack Solomons, who promoted Monday night's show, wants to pair Cooper with Johansson in a European title match.  
Around the ringside Monday night was the largest collection of British and American fight bosses seen in London in decades.  
The Associated Press card had Cooper an easy winner, 11-4 in rounds, giving London only the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth.

Those Summerside Aces are back at the Sports Arena tonight and they have the same objective they've had all season long. That's to beat whoever skates out against them.  
Tonight the opposition will be the Navy Tars, the outfit that has been blowing hot and cold since the league got underway. Aces will be minus Coke Grady and Bonny Howatt and their absence should help the Tars' cause. Grady has two games left to serve in his three game suspension and Howatt finishes his two-game sentence tonight.  
Action gets underway at 8:15 sharp.
