NEW POST OFFICES.

RE-DISTRIBUTION OF SEATS

GENERAL NEWS.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

OTTAWA, May 3.

In the Senate, yesterday, Senator Geo. W. Howland, Prince County, moved the Irish Resolutions, which were a short time ago unanimously adopted by the House of Commons, and ably supported by Sir John McDonald. The Senator's speech, in moving the resolutions, was one of the most exhaustive and eloquent yet delivered on the subject.

Senator Power followed, and spoke briefly in support of the resolutions. Senator Haythorne moved an amendment to the resolutions which was seconded by Senator Reed. The amendment was a declaration of confidence in the Government of Mr. Gladstone, and its policy regarding the Irish Land Act, etc.

The question came up for discussion again to-day, and it is feared that the amendment introduced by Senator Haythorne will defeat the resolutions in the Senate.

A new post office will be established at Mansfield, King's County. This makes in all eight new offices granted to King's County since January last.

The supplementary estimates will be laid on the table to-morrow. The Grits admit that the re distribution of seats Bill will prove disastrous to their party.

A large deputation including the Island Members waited on Sir Leonard Tilley to-day to urge the removal of postage on newspapers.

NEW YORK, May 2.

Among the passengers from Europe, to-day, were Lord Randolph Churchill, the Duke of Manchester, Lord Mandeville, Count Montausain, and Lord Elphinstone.

BROWNSVILLE, TEXAS, May 2. Black small-pox is killing off thousands of the inhabitants of Sinto and Compaechy in Mexico. A panic prevails.

DUBLIN, May 3.

Parnell and O'Kelly have been unconditionally released from Killmainham jail. After their release they drove in a cab from the outskirts of the city to Harcourt street station, where they took the train

for Avondale. They will remain at Parnell's residence two days.

LONDON, May 2.

Seven persons were killed by an explosion in Victoria colliery in Leeds.

HONG KONG, May 2.

The French have taken Hanoi after two hours battle. It is believed that the loss is not heavy.

LONDON, May 2.

It is reported that the ship "Western Monarch" with three hundred emigrants has foundered.
