

Brooklyn Wins National League Flag 2nd Straight

 BROOKLYN (AP)—Brooklyn Dodgers clinaxed one of the most exciting races in baseball history Sunday, capturing their second consecutive National League pennant on the final day of the season by defeating Pittsburgh Pirates 8-6.

The victory, Brooklyn's third straight over the Pirates, assured manager Walter Alston's world champions of meeting the New York Yankees in the world series next Wednesday. Brooklyn burst into a one-game lead Saturday with a doubleheader sweep over Pittsburgh while St. Louis Cardinals turned back Milwaukee Braves.

A packed Ebbets Field crowd of 31,983 came in for the kill and were treated to a flash of old-time Dodger power. Determined to nail down their 10th flag and fourth in the last five years, the Dodgers.

led by Duke Snider, reached five Pittsburgh pitchers for 12 hits, five of them home runs, accounting for all but one of their runs.

HOME RUN CHAMP
 Snider, the league's new home run champion, blasted two home runs, driving in four runs, to increase two season's homer output to 43, a club record. Sandy Amoros also had a pair, his 15th and 16th, and Jackie Robinson contributed his 10th of the season.

The Dodgers' mightiest home run demonstration of the season made it possible for Don Newcombe, Brooklyn's biggest winner in 32 years, to record his 27th triumph. The big right-hander, however, needed assistance from Don Bessent in the eighth inning, after the Pirates had clubbed him for 11 of their 13 hits and all their runs.

Bobby Bragan employed five pitchers, finishing up with his ace, Bob Friend, who had started the first game of the series and worked in relief in the second game. The freshman manager also used five pinch hitters, a pinch runner, two second basemen and two shortstops to no avail.

BROOKS OUTHIT
 Pittsburgh outhit the Dodgers, 13 to 12, but only one of the Pirates' safeties went for the distance. That was Lee Walls' bases-empty home run in the eighth which finished Newcombe. Walls came within a hair's breadth of hitting another homer in the fourth but his towering drive tipped off the top of the right field screen and bounced back for a three-bagger. There was only one out at the time but Pittsburgh failed to score when Dick Groat fouled to Carl Furillo in short

Five Team Island Hockey League To Start In Nov.

A five team Island Hockey League will swing into operation for the 1956-57 season at the Sports Arena on Thursday, November 8 or Tuesday, November 13 if it was decided yesterday at a meeting in the City Hall.

The four definite starters include the Parkdale Flyers, Saint Dunstan's University, Summerside Aces and Montague. The Basillea Youth Club are almost certain competitors but needed a meeting of the Club members last night in order to get club approval.

Milton's Old Spain and Prince of Wales College sought entry to the League. However, it was moved that the number of teams competing would remain the same as last year with the Old Spain getting first chance to enter a team in the event that one team dropped out. The Old Spain was given preference due to the fact that they were first to make application for a League berth.

It was moved by Lash Schurman and seconded by Barry Moore that the last place team in the Five team league would not be eligible for the playoffs.

It was also moved that the teams would use resident players and would be allowed until midnight, November 15 to sign up a maximum of two imports. A resident player is a player residing in the Province as of November 1. The question of League officials will be left up to the executive. Game officials will be appointed at the discretion of the executive only.

The League will secure goal judges and free passes to games will be given to players only. These passes will not be transferable.

The League decided to abide by the M. A. H. A. ruling that players signed by a club last year are still the property of that club and players would only become free agents through a team disbarring or being given their release by the team.

The teams will work with the Sports Arena on the same financial arrangement as they did a year ago. The home team will take all its share of the gate.

The question of home games at Summerside and Charlottetown was also discussed. In view of the fact that they are four home teams in Charlottetown and only one in Summerside it was thought impossible to have one home game a week in Summerside and two in Charlottetown.

A possible solution was suggested by which all Summerside home games would be one point games. This would give Summerside twice as many home games and enable them to play two games a week in their own rink.

To make up for the extra traveling involved it was suggested that the visiting teams would be given a split of the gate on the extra game they would be forced to play in Summerside. It would probably mean that each team instead of playing two or three games in Summerside would play four or six games during the schedule.

For example suppose each team played sixteen games during the schedule. It would mean each team would play the other four times having two games at home and two away from home. Under the proposed setup each Charlottetown team would play in Summerside four times.

This would give Summerside 16 home games each worth one point. Along with eight games away from home they would play a total of 24 games. The other teams would then have to play 18 games, eight at home and ten away from home. All would play for a total of 22 points, 16 points at home and 16 points away from home.

This matter will be considered more fully at future meetings.

Yesterday's meeting was presided over by Cleaver MacLean with representatives from all teams present. Another meeting will be called within several days.

Dick Irvin Resigns As Coach Of Chicago Black Hawks

ST. CATHARINES, Ont. (CP)—Dick Irvin, 64-year-old veteran Saturday night resigned as coach of the Chicago Black Hawks because of ill-health.

The resignation was announced at the Black Hawks training camp here. Irvin was several days late reporting to the camp after being detained in hospital in Montreal.

The former Toronto and Montreal coach, who returned to the Chicago team last year, described the retirement decision as the toughest in his 26 years as an NHL coach.

STARTED WITH HAWKS
 The white-haired Irvin thus ends his NHL coaching career where he started it—Chicago. Irvin coached the Black Hawks in the 1930-31 season. He became coach of the Toronto Maple Leafs in the following season and piloted the club through the 1936-37 season. Irvin then moved to the Montreal Canadiens where he was coach from 1940 to 1955.

Last season, Irvin returned to the Black Hawks.

During his coaching career, Irvin had four Stanley Cup winners, Toronto Maple Leafs in 1961-62.

BROOKLYN (AP)—Brooklyn's old pros acted as though they had just won their first pennant—not their 10th, fourth in the last five years.

The old guys whooped it up. Manager Walt Alston, flashing a wide grin, slapped his players on the back, shook hands and patted bottoms as the Dodgers poured into the dressing room after nailing the National League championship with an 8-6 victory over Pittsburgh.

But while the fans shouted "bring on the Yankees" as they waited for their heroes outside the dressing room, they were little thought of the American League champions inside.

The Dodgers, world champions haven't had time to think about the Yankees. They were too busy winning the pennant—doing it the hard way by sweeping three from the Pirates while Milwaukee skidded at St. Louis.

 When they first barged into the clubhouse, their hollers and yips were almost a bit overdone—almost an "act" for the television cameras. But once they had grabbed a beer and had paused a moment to take a gulp and let the pennant sink in, they went on a tear.

Roy Campanella bustled through the mob, gripping and kissing the ball with which relief pitcher Don Bessent had struck out pinch-hitter Hank Folles to end the game. A bunch of the Brooks mobbed Peewee Reese and doused his head with beer.

In the Pittsburgh dressing room, manager Bobby Bragan said: "Those guys deserve to win it."
