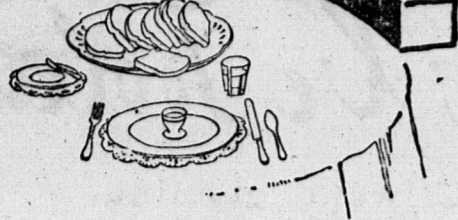

## TO THE POULTRYMAN:

A Weekly Letter Containing Practical Pointers in the Management and Care of Standard Bred Poultry, Taken From the Daily Log Book of Sunny Crest Poultry Farm, Bear River, P. E. I. by the Manager.

While it is advantageous to get your chicks as soon as possible after the bad weather has passed, or as soon as one can reasonably expect settled weather, there are certain things to be considered if one is to reap the benefits of early hatched chicks and if these things are not given attention it would be far better to wait until such time as conditions will be such that such strict care and attention will be unnecessary or a least will not be so exacting.

We have a very good illustration of this in weather conditions this spring and at "Sunnycrest" we have had a splendid chance to make a check of results. It is worse than useless to hatch out a lot of chicks early in March when it would be necessary to keep them confined for a long time after a certain time in confinement they will not only come on, but will receive a check in development which will be noticeable throughout the whole life of the bird. Where birds are hatched and raised in large numbers and where, for various reasons it is imperative to get them out early in the season, a great deal of attention is given to brooding, and often at so great an expense that to the smaller breeder or to the one who keeps a small flock as a side line the thing would be prohibitive both in expense and in time spent on it. Then again there are climatic conditions to be considered and they surely go a long way in determining the best time to get out the chicks, do not be misled by reading of some party a thousand miles away who hatched his or her entire flock in February and put themselves on record as stating that chicks hatched later than that would never be profitable.

Do you think that as soon as chicks get a few feathers they no longer require heat, their coat of feathers is very slim protection for many weeks and a little heat, especially at night will be found very beneficial to best growth, after they are roosting properly it can be safely dropped.

VENTILATION  
The young chicks require an unlimited supply of fresh air during the stage of development and ventilation in their growing quarters should be abundant both night and day, this does not mean a window open and a direct draft blowing in on them during the night or a cold southeast rain heating into their house during the day.

FEEDING  
Feed is of course a very important thing but it is less often neglected than the others and requires less attention, see that they get the proper proportions of clean, sweet food, and see that as far as possible it is fed dry, an abundance of green succulent foods that are both a food and a medicine to the growing chick, and a certain proportion of animal protein, milk supplies this and is good.

## School Department

TEACHER, TRUSTEE AND JANITOR

(Selected by D. J. Shaw)  
The teacher, who would properly cooperate with all concerned for her pupils welfare must consider her task a sacred one. Bad temper, incorrect language are breach of good faith. The teacher should know enough of the home conditions of her pupils to adjust her teaching and judgment to their lives. The teacher must co-operate with the trustees in respecting her contracts, and properly caring for school property. The teacher should help out the janitor in his work by insisting on keeping the rooms clean and tidy. The same spirit of co-operation as exists in the work of the parents and teachers should characterize the relations of trustees and teacher. A trustee board is not merely a body chosen to look after the financial end of hiring a teacher, and supporting the school. If they keep before them the motto "for the children's sake", they will make few errors. The trustees should be awake to the best interests of their school and also should be acquainted with the principle details of School Law. They must learn to measure service.

It should be the duty of trustees to make the school grounds the best spot in the district, the grounds kept clean at all times and attractive. The school should be supplied with good blackboards, maps and window shades. For the sake of teacher and pupils the trustees should see that the stoves are in working order and plenty of good fuel, that the windows and doors are tight and free from draughts, and have some arrangements for good ventilation. The school should be swept every day and floors scrubbed as often as required. A good janitor should be engaged but to often this work is left in the hands of careless pupils and the remuneration is so low that it will not attract a good boy to do the work. The boy that bids the lowest at the school meeting gets the job, regardless of fitness. The janitor and the teacher have direct influence on the children. As the teacher directs their minds, so is the janitor responsible for much of their bodily comforts and health. Scores of teachers and hundreds of children spend 14 of

their day in dirty school rooms. Among our schools, 75 per cent of the outhouses are in an unsanitary condition. A clean school and out houses is but a request of decent civilization. For the children's sake let us co-operate in educational endeavor and conditions. ## The Famine is Still On

300,000 Children will Die of Starvation unless we Continue to Supply Food up to the End of August.

WHAT are YOU to believe about the famine situation in Russia—the idle, unsupported statements of prejudiced papers, or the firsthand knowledge of such men as Lord Emmott, Lord Weardale and Sir Benjamin Robertson, who are devoting their time and energy to saving millions of children from starving.

In February, Sir Benjamin Robertson, with the approval of the British Government, made an exhaustive survey of the famine districts and reported that help must be continued at least until the end of August.

- 1.—The Russian Relief Fund, Chairman Lord Emmott, with whom is associated Sir Arthur Stanley, Chairman of the British Red Cross.
- 2.—The Friends' Relief Mission—the British Organization of the Quakers.
- 3.—The Save The Children Fund, with Lord Weardale as chairman.

These organizations are feeding 300,000 children in the Saratov area and are endeavoring to help some of the millions of adults who are in the direst need of food.

Will you not help these British organizations to save the helpless children of Russia from starving.
