Board Of Trade Drive For Members 'Success'

Yesterday's city blitz for membership by the Charlottetown Board of Trade was termed a "great success". Last evening at 5:30 the board had collected \$1,450 in new membership fees, and 90 new members. Board of Trade president G.G.K. Peake said last night the blitz "a complete success. The response was terrific, there were very few turn-downs".

A spokesman for the board said last night that many had the forms already filled in when campaign members called. The workers brought in their returns between five and six o'clock and prizes were awarded on a point system based on new membership sales and cash returns. L.D. MacKay and Al MacLeod won the team award.

The Board of Trade spokesman said last night that there were too many prospects to contact yesterday, but all are expected to be reached by next Wednesday. These prospects are hoped to swell membership by 45. If this is so, membership will be doubled, as the membership prior to the blitz stood at 130. Mr. Peake also announced the annual meeting will be held late in May. New members and members from other island boards of trade will be invited to this meeting.

Liberal Leader Alex Matheson who is a patient. He will be welcomed to Queen Charlotte High School by George Fraser's committee. New officers will be named by a nominating committee and installed.

Fire Guts Car Near S'side

SUMMERSIDE — A sudden flash fire, believed to have started in the electrical wiring under the dash of their car, forced a family of five to abandon it while driving in to Summerside Monday night. Gordon Edward Davidson, Summerside, his wife and three children were heading home at about 9:45, in a 1958 Dodge when he noticed flames and smoke coming from under the dash. He immediately pulled over to the shoulder and quickly had his family get out of the vehicle. No one was injured. The Summerside Fire Department was called and a pumper went to the scene, but by this time the flames had obtained a firm foothold on the interior of the car. Quick use of the fire hoses kept the flames from damaging the outside of the vehicle to any extent, but the interior was gutted. The incident was investigated by Cst. New UC Women's Bd. Opens Toronto Session

TORONTO (CP) — The new Board of Women of the United Church of Canada settled down to business Tuesday, tackling its organizational problems and moving swiftly through reports of conference presidents.

The 50-member board, governing body of the United Church Women, was formed in January when the UCW was organized to replace the Women's Missionary Society and the Women's Association. SUMMERSIDE—Three speeders appeared in police court yesterday and each was fined by Magistrate Richard Hinton, QC, commensurate with the speed at which they were driving when apprehended. SET UP RADAR

The post-war record high for unemployment occurred in February last year when 719,000 persons were without jobs and seeking work—11.3 per cent of the labor force.
MORE EMPLOYED
Employment picked up more strongly than usual in manufacturing, construction and service industries to help push the employment total to 5,694,000, up 54,000 from February. This was 4.4 per cent higher than the 5,540,000 persons employed in March last year—one of the largest increases in the last five years. There were 160,000 more men at work, and 86,000 more women, than a year earlier.

The joint report by the bureau of statistics and federal labor department is based on a survey of 35,000 households across the country. During the month from mid-February to mid-March, the largest employment rise occurred in Quebec. Employment changes elsewhere were relatively small—higher in Ontario, the Prairies and Pacific region and lower in the Atlantic region. Compared with March of last year, employment was "significantly higher" in all regions, the report said. Increases ranged from just over one per cent in Ontario to just under seven per cent in Quebec.
