**Pheasant, Hungarian Programs Discussed At Alberton Meeting**

A resolution favoring the continuation of the Pheasant program at Robert's Hatchery, Tryon, and a second resolution strongly recommending an experimental program for raising Hungarian partridge were approved at a special meeting of the West Prince Branch of the P.E.I. Fish and Game Association, held in the Alberton Legion Hall last night. Both resolutions were addressed to the Provincial Association for Government.

Under the proposed Pheasant program for 1957 and '58, 200 Pheasants now on hand for breeding purposes would be released next summer, approximately 1,800 fourteen-week-old birds would be released in the fall of '57 followed by an additional release of 300 full grown flyers in the spring of '58.

In favoring a local hatchery, instead of importing Pheasants from the States at approximately \$4.50 each, a number of speakers stressed the importance of encouraging and supporting an Island game farm, using Island feeds, where the staff would gain much valuable information about raising upland game of all kinds and would be ready to provide birds in future years if needed. During the discussion on the scarcity of Huns, it was estimated that only about fifteen birds were shot in Western Prince during the season just closed. **Supreme Court In Summerside**

An appeal from conviction under the Excise Act by John Joseph Gillis, Port Hill, for possession of illicit spirits, was dismissed, but the penalty was reduced at the fall sitting of the Supreme Court, held in the Court House, Summerside Tuesday, Mr. Justice Mark R. MacGuigan presiding.

The Court confirmed the conviction of Magistrate R. S. Hinton, Q.C. in Magistrate's Court, on July 5th, 1956, when Gillis was found guilty on a second offense, of possession of a quantity (8 ozs.) of illicit spirits and was sentenced to six months in jail and fined \$500.00. The penalty was reduced to a fine of \$200 or three months, when evidence of a second offense was not submitted by the Crown. W. Chester S. MacDonald was attorney for the appellant, and Mr. Harold Goodwin acted for the Crown.

Other cases on the docket for the November sitting were set down to December 3rd on agreement of counsel.

These included two civil jury actions, Ralph MacCaull versus the Canadian National Railways and Frances MacLeod, Summerside versus Anthony Konopka, Ontario. Other non-jury cases set down to December 3rd were Adele MacLeod, an infant by Frederick B. MacLeod, versus Anthony Konopka, and Mr. Ensor Bonness versus Anthony Konopka.

The last three actions listed above resulted from an accident at Albany Corner last summer, when a car from Ontario, owned by Anthony Konopka was in collision with a vehicle driven by Ensor Bonness, Summerside, in which Mrs. Fred MacLeod, Summerside and daughter Adele, were injured.
