A coroner's jury last night recommended that the white center lines on the highway should be repainted immediately following any road repairs. Grand Master To Open new hall Here

The new Loyal Orange Lodge Hall on Kirkwood Drive will be officially opened this evening by the most worshipful Grand Master George Warren of St. John's, Nfld.
