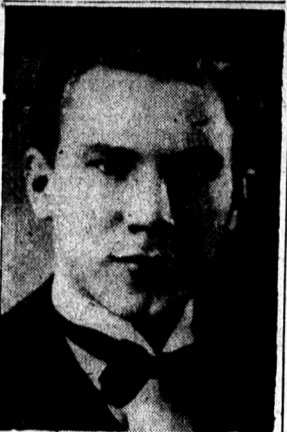

4th Kings's Member Voices Approval Of Bus Franchise

"I feel it would be a good move on the part of the Government to provide a franchise to the Canadian National Railways to operate buses instead of passenger trains in all sections of this Province," said Dr. Lorne Bonnell (Liberal), Fourth District of King's, in his maiden speech in the Legislature yesterday in seconding the Draft Address.

"Particularly is this true in my own district," Dr. Bonnell said, where on account of weight restrictions our train goes only as far as Southport, and the passengers have to be transferred to the station at Charlottetown. Our train leaves Charlottetown about 3.30 and arrives in Murray Harbour any time between 7 and 10 o'clock at night, a matter of four to seven hours to go 40 miles. I feel a much quicker and more convenient service could be given by buses."

The seconder of the Address offered his congratulations to Mr. Speaker, to the mover of the Address and to Premier Jones. He also voiced his regret at the death of King George VI and pleasure in bearing allegiance to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth.

Dr. Bonnell said he had been told by members of the legal profession, more particularly the practising members in the country, that the revision of the statutes filled a long overdue want. "The man responsible for the revision is to be highly congratulated."

He advised the Government to go slowly in the matter of electoral reform. "Our present system," he said, "was established many years ago, by wise and cautious men, taking into full consideration the boundaries of the different districts, their racial and religious affiliations." He recalled that though feelings might run high as election day approached, when it was over the workers of the different parties joined in congratulating the winners and then went back to their farm or other work.

Dr. Bonnell was roundly applauded as he concluded and later received the personal congratulations of many of the older members of the House, including all members of the Opposition. In his remarks Mr. R. R. Bell, leader of the Opposition said that the junior member for Fourth King's may have a record for recent years in the Legislature, due to his election at such an early age.
