

Kensington Races.

OVER three thousand people assembled at Kensington yesterday to witness the races at Kensington Driving Park. The train which arrived from Charlottetown contained over two hundred passengers; the train from Summerside double that number, while the people from the country surrounding mustered in great force. The day was everything that could be desired; and, clear of the rosy element, which prevailed to a very large extent, people enjoyed themselves well, and were pleased with the races, generally. Four races took place, viz: Three minute race, gentlemen's driving race, to sulkeys, a race for three-year-olds, and a sweepstakes running race. The first race called was the three minute class, for which six entered, and three started, viz:—

S. Carroll's by. g. "Happy Jack," James Dover's "Lady Bagnall," J. Squarebrides, gr. g. "Hopeful."

First Heat was trotted splendidly by Hopeful and Lady Bagnall. Hopeful, at the quarter mile, led, trotting in remarkably good style, with Lady Bagnall working well at his wheel. They passed the half mile neck-and-neck. At the turn Hopeful spurred and pocketed his opponent, and trotted well to the three quarter, when Lady Bagnall spurred up alongside, and set Hopeful off his feet. He galloped until he led by three lengths, and finished a few yards ahead of Lady Bagnall. Happy Jack, who was in rather bad condition, apparently sore, finished some lengths in the rear. The heat was given to Hopeful. Lady Bagnall's driver having claimed second place.

Second Heat.—Lady Bagnall went to the fore with apparent ease, and led at the half mile by over one hundred yards. This lead was so increased that Hopeful and Happy Jack were unable to save distance. Lady Bagnall was awarded the heat and race amid cheers from the spectators.

The next race was for Gentlemen's driving horses, to sulkeys. Seven entered and five started, viz:—

G. Muttart's "Planter," C. Westcott's "Zulu," S. Stumbles' "Flora Temple," C. A. McNutt's "Messenger," Marchbank's "Honest Joe."

The first heat was trotted well by Messenger, Planter, and Flora Temple, particularly. Zulu acted badly, and took fourth position in the heat, while Messenger took first, Planter second, Flora Temple third, and Honest Joe distanced. In the second heat Zulu and Messenger trotted surprisingly, and although Planter galloped lively he was unable to save his distance. Flora Temple was badly cut under the shoulder, and otherwise unfit for the heat. She fell to the rear, trotted in leisurely and was also distanced. The heat was given to Zulu, with Messenger second. Zulu also won the next two heats, and therefore, the race. The speed exhibited by Zulu and Messenger was something unusual and with a little care and training they will prove themselves trotters close on the 2.40 class.

The three year old race, in which four started, was won by a handsome mare owned by Mr. P. Read, of Hope River, with Mr. John Wedlock's Sweep second, and R. Fitzsimmons' Lady Duft third.

The sweepstake race, one of the prettiest races of the day, was won by W. Mitchell's Mollie, with L. Silliphant's Gypsy Queen second.

Cardigan Tea Party.

THE Tea-party held yesterday at Cardigan Road in aid of St. Cuthbert's Church was in every respect a grand success. The train which arrived at the grounds from this city and other intermediate stations contained over four hundred and fifty excursionists. Those from this city speak highly of the treatment they received at the hands of the good people of Cardigan.

The Tea Party at Stanhope.

THE Tea party held at Stanhope in aid of the new Presbyterian Church was well patronised by people from Charlottetown, as well as the districts surrounding Stanhope. The drive to and from Stanhope is one of the pleasantest on the Island, and was thoroughly enjoyed by those who drove from the city. The committee deserve the thanks of the public for the manner in which they treated their guests. We learn that the tea was a great financial success.

The Excursion to Pictou.

THE excursion to Pictou was patronised by over one hundred and seventy persons. The steamer left at 7.30 in the morning, and after a very pleasant passage arrived at Pictou, where the excursionists spent several hours and returned—leaving at 4 o'clock. The excursionists are delighted with the attention paid them by the captain and other officers of the boat, who lost no opportunity to make everything most agreeable.

B. C. Sunday School Excursion.

About four hundred parents and children attended the Bible Christian excursion to Orwell in the steamer "Heather Belle," yesterday. We learn that the excursion was all that could be desired, and the excursionists returned well pleased with the trip to Orwell.

Point Du Chene.

The excursion to Point du Chene was not, it appears, appreciated by Charlottetownians. Only nine excursionists left this city.

PARIS, June 30. Throughout the Provinces to-day the Jesuits quitted their establishments under protest, declaring that they only yielded to compulsion. At Avignon and Marseilles their sympathisers were somewhat disorderly. At Lyons and Angers the Jesuits have constituted themselves as civil societies and the question thus raised will be decided by the courts on the second of July.
