THE Pioneer announces the death of Mr. John Walker, of New Annan, who passed away at the age of eighty six years. He was among the first settlers of the locality, and was universally esteemed for his many excellent qualities.

SCOTT ACT.—The application of Donald McManan for a certiorari to remove a judgment had before the stipendiary Magistrate of Summerside, was, on Monday, dismissed by the Supreme Court with costs. F. Peters Esq., appeared for the applicant, and N. McCool, Esq., for the Alliance.

AN important matter is now being argued before Mr. Justice Peters, in reference to the liquidation of the Bank of Prince Edward Island. The counsel for certain shareholders contend that the call upon shares should only be for \$64.44, and not as the liquidators contend for \$40 per share.

THE verdict returned by the jury at the inquest held on view of the bodies of the men Brown, Crossman, and Fraser, killed during the collision at Beaver Brook, on the Intercolonial Railway, a few days ago, was: "That they came to their death under certain circumstances, stated accidentally, casually and by misfortune, and not otherwise."

ON December 6th, deputations from Toronto, Montreal, Halifax, St. John, and Charlottetown, to secure larger appropriations by Government for the purpose of carrying on the work of collecting vital statistics for the Dominion, and also for the organization of a permanent bureau of vital statistics, are expected to arrive on this day. Mr. Pope, Minister of Agriculture at Ottawa, and present their case.

A son of Mr. Samuel Wheatley, West Royal, met with a very painful accident on Monday last. He was in the act of shooting a partridge near his father's slaughter-house, when the gun burst cut his face and hands frightfully, and seriously injured one of his eyes. Medical aid was called in but it was some time before he recovered from the shock. He is, we are pleased to learn, now doing well.

IT is understood that the Government will defray the expenses of delegates from Toronto, Montreal, Halifax, St. John and Charlottetown, who will go to the Minister of Agriculture in a few days in regard to a Dominion Bureau of Vital Statistics, in which the Boards of Health are much interested. Their expenses while in Ottawa will also be paid by Government.

A LAND BILL, pending before the New Zealand Legislature, provides that the Government shall not sell any more land, but shall grant leases of twenty-one years instead. Provisions are in the leases for the compensation for improvements, etc., if the lease be cancelled at the end of the time for which they are drawn. Government thus holds the fee of the lands, though the motive of the bill is to encourage settlers. The rate of rentals to be asked will probably determine the feasibility of the plan.

THE mail steamer Elysian, which arrived at Halifax from Liverpool, Monday morning, experienced almost nothing but storm weather all the way across, there being hardly a single day without its heavy winds or tempestuous westerly gales. The waves frequently broke over the ship, and in one of them, as it swept across the deck, a boat was torn from its fastenings and smashed. The only vessel sighted on the passage was a large, three-masted steamer, bound Eastward. She was seen on Sunday week, but was too far off to be made out.

The movement of trains on the Railway is brisk. Freights are very heavy and the delay of last night impeded the progress of trains more or less. Lightish rain until 3 1/2 last night, and the train for Summerside did not reach its destination until 1:30 this morning. The engine, we learn, got derailed at Hunter River, and a special engine had to be sent to relieve her. The train from Summerside was also delayed this morning. She did not arrive here until one o'clock. The delay was owing to the engine of the Tignish, train which left this morning, running off the track at North Wiltshire. It was replaced in two hours, and the train proceeded. The train from Georgetown to St. John's did not reach this city today until 1:45 p. m., owing to heavy freights. A special train was despatched from here last night to take the surplus freight along the line to Summerside.
