

Comments On Resignation Of Mr. Drew As PC Leader

Comments by figures in public life on the resignation, announced in Ottawa Friday, of Opposition leader Drew as leader of the Progressive Conservative party: George Hees, Progressive Conservative member of Parliament for Toronto-Broadview and former president of the party's national organization; "Canada has been deprived of a great leader and it has been a particular shock to those of us who are close friends and colleagues."
"His great devotion to duty, both to his country and to his party, caused him to carry a far too-heavy work load and the burden of his responsibilities as leader of the opposition has taken a severe toll of his health."
NO SACRIFICE TOO GREAT
In Toronto, Donald Fleming, Conservative MP for Toronto East-Hinton, said:
"Mr. Drew's retirement from the leadership of the Conservative party is a heavy loss to the Canadian nation."
"No sacrifice has been too great and no duty too stern for him as long as it served Canada."
"He was never better than in the 1955 and 1956 sessions of Par-

liament following his return to the House of Commons after his attack of meningitis. In this recent session he rose to great heights. In the critical days of this spring his leadership was superb."
SPEEDY ACTION NECESSARY
In Prince Albert, Sask., John Diefenbaker, 61, Progressive Conservative member of Parliament for Prince Albert, said "speed in the calling of a national convention is of the essence."
"The expectation is that there will be a general election in June. It will require all of the time between now and June for the new leader to be able to tour all parts of Canada and place the party's message before the people."
He said he is disappointed at Mr. Drew's resignation and hopes the resignation that prompted it will be "reasonably short-lived."
Mr. Diefenbaker, runner-up to Mr. Drew for the party leadership at the 1949 convention and mentioned as a possible successor, said any comment on a successor by Mr. Drew "would be most improper at a time like this."
In Halifax, Robert L. Stanfield, Nova Scotia Progressive Con-

servative leader, said Mr. Drew undermined his health in the service of his country.
"Mr. Drew has a long record of distinguished service to our country," Mr. Stanfield said. "The Conservative party is deeply in his debt for his service to us as our leader."
CCF EXPRESSES REGRET
In Ottawa, spokesmen for other parliamentary opposition parties expressed regret at Mr. Drew's forced retirement.
CCF leader Coldwell is on a tour of Europe. But national CCF secretary Lorne Ingle said members of the party were sorry to hear that the Conservative leader had been forced to step down.
"In spite of our differences," he said, "we do regret that his illness is such that he has had to resign."
Social Credit leader Solon Low said he heard Mr. Drew's decision with regret.
Mr. Low said he had "strong sympathy" for Mr. Drew personally and for Mrs. Drew. "While at the same time I realize that the Progressive Conservative party suffers an irreparable loss at a very crucial time."
