

# Maritimer Calls For New Merchant Marine Policy

NEW SWA (CP) - a new protective policy to protect Canadian shipping until such time as the Dominion was ready to join the Maritime Union by a new treaty with the Maritime.

David R. Cruise 30-year-old relative of Queens - Lunenburg said a Canadian merchant marine should be re-established. He said the Dominion should speak for the labor who defeated the former minister R. B. Bennett's speech on June 10. He spoke two days after the government had announced its acquiescence to the planned transfer of the eight-week-old West Island of Canadian National Steamships from Canadian to Trinidad registry.

Mr. Cruise said that at the end of 1956, four countries - Panama, Honduras, Liberia and Costa Rica - had registered 11 per cent of all world deep-sea tonnage. Twenty per cent of the world's ships had been registered under those flags.

Owners of those ships had no connection with the registering countries. There were no government regulations governing them, no taxes, no collective agreements covering their crews and no minimum work standards for the crews.

**HALETS RE-MENACE**

HALETS so registered are a menace to traditional merchant navies, Mr. Cruise said.

An interest in a conference should be called to convince those countries that their attitude was unfair and harmful to all. "Sea Scouts" was a major maritime power. Its shipbuilding was the oldest manufacturing industry in Canada. Now its maritime industry would turn to the merchant marine for manpower.

Mr. Cruise called for establishment of a coast guard, for aid and end to the rule whereby Canadian dragoons are sent 12 miles offshore while foreign boats can fish up to the 12-mile limit.

# Paints and Photographs The St. Lawrence Seaway

# Further Honors Acquired By Island Guernsey Cattle

Further honors have been won by the Guernsey herd of J. Egan Hurry of Winslow. A letter from Bruce Hoddgins, secretary of the Canadian Guernsey Breeders' Association, informs Mr. Hurry that his herd has placed third in Canada in the small herd division, which is made up of herds with cows completing between six and fifteen R.O.P. records in the last testing year.

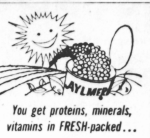
Mr. Hurry's herd is also the highest producing in this province regardless of size. His cows have averaged 10,854 pounds of milk and 34 pounds fat. This represents 126.2 percent of the breed class average in milk and 129.9 per cent of the breed class average in butterfat.

Mr. Hurry's herd has long been among the top producers in the Guernsey world and he has had several outstanding individual producers.
