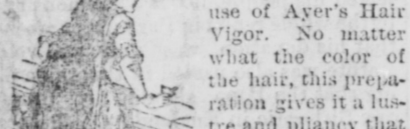

OTTAWA CORRESPONDENCE.

AN INTERESTING ADDRESS.—MR. MEIKLE IN OTTAWA—A PRESBYTERIAN ON THE JESUIT BILL.

Ottawa, Feb. 25.

I had the pleasure on Saturday of listening to a most interesting address given by Mr. Davin, M. P., to several members of the Press Gallery, who interviewed him in one of the lobbies. The subject matter of his discourse was Rationalism, and he told the story of the development of that heresy in glowing language, interspersed with classical quotations, and illustrated his theme by innumerable instances in ancient history, showing the formation of the Egyptian, Assyrian, Judae, Grecian, Roman and Christian theologies. It was a genuine treat, and the "Press" was highly delighted.

On Sunday I went to hear Mr. Meikle's address to men. It was given in the New Opera House, which was packed with young and old men. Mr. Meikle is looking somewhat fatter than he did when on the Island. His voice is very effective, and his solo singing is very effective. His address was directed to the several worldly pursuits that lead men to reject Christ. He instanced the cases of those who, for riches, for power, for sensuality, and for a more convenient season defer making a stand for religion. He severely condemned modern amusements, especially waltzing, and said that 75 per cent of the unfortunate women of New York ascribe their fall to dancing.

In the evening, St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church was our objective point. We heard the Rev. Mr. Herridge, who, by the way, is married to the second daughter of the Rev. Thomas Duncan, formerly pastor of St. James' Presbyterian Church in Charlottetown. Mr. Herridge is a young man of good appearance, and, judging by his address last night, of more than ordinary ability. During his sermon he referred to the agitation in connection with the Jesuit Bill, and condemned, in no unsparing terms, the conduct of those who were raising an agitation in Toronto of killing the Jesuits, should they come there, might be and evidence of Protestantism, but it was not Christianity. He pointed out the fallacies in the rules and belief of the Jesuits, but said that it would be well if Protestants were as zealous in advocating and following what they considered the truth.

St. Andrew's Church is a fine building, and has a grand organ and choir. All Presbyterian Churches in the cities I have visited are noted for their fine preachers and choirs.

To-day the principal business of the House of Commons is private bills.

The Budget Speech is to be delivered by Hon. Mr. Foster on Tuesday, 5th March.

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The Hospital Fire.

ABOUT twenty minutes to ten o'clock this morning the alarm sounded for a fire in the Prince Edward Island Hospital Building on St. Peter's Road, near Easton Street. The fire started in the room of one of the servants in the upper flat, and was caused by a defective flue. Before the fire was discovered the flames had penetrated through to the roof, and by the time the firemen arrived on the scene the roof of the old wing was in a blaze. There was a good deal of delay and bustle before the firemen got down to work, the hose bursting several times, greatly retarding operations. However, when they settled down to work the fire, which was making great progress during the delay, was soon got under control, and in a short time was subdued. In the meantime the more helpless of the patients had been removed, as had also a good deal of the furniture. The roof of the old wing was burnt badly, but that of the new did not suffer to any very great extent. The walls of some of the rooms in the upper flat were torn down, as were also the plastering and lathing beneath the stairway. The whole building was, however, badly damaged by water, almost every room in the place being flooded.

The alarm was telephoned Central Office from the hospital, and in about twenty seconds after receiving the information, Chief Engineer Large was advised of the fire, and in less than two minutes after he received word Silsby hose reel was on its way to the scene. Such promptness is commendable, and shows clearly the great advantage that would result from the introduction of an electric alarm. However, no matter how promptly the alarm is given and how much water we have, if the hose and other apparatus are not in good working order, the work of the firemen will be considerably retarded.

The Hospital building was insured for \$2500, and the furniture for \$500, in one of the companies represented by Mr. F. W. Hyndman.

Inconsistency.

At the public meetings held in King's County during the last Dominion election, Dr. Robertson was wont to grow quite pathetic over the pork question. He said that the Dominion Government, if they wished to be considered consistent, should raise the duty upon American pork in order to give Canadian pork raisers a chance of supplying the home market. So far, so good. But what do we find him doing the other day when his party proposed to let American barley come into Canada free, in order to injure the price of Island oats? Why, he voted with his party, and against the interests of our Island farmers. It is surely time such a representative should come home.
